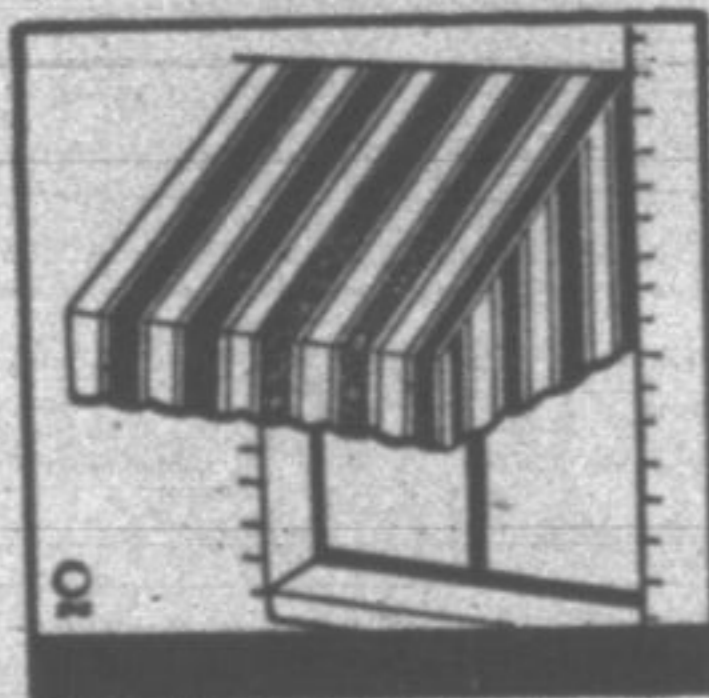

cago daylight saving time, and will arrive at Ravinia at 8:12 p.m. This train will leave Ravinia immediately after the performance and make a rapid return to Chicago.

The North Shore Electric line has trains leaving Adams and Wabash throughout the day at 13 and 43 minutes after the hour. In addition, there will be a Ravinia Opera Special every night of the week, including Sunday, which starts at Woodlawn, leaving the Dorchester avenue station at 6:48 p.m., Chicago daylight saving time, and making numerous stops.

There will be adequate train service at the close of each performance.

### Telephone and Ticket Service

The usual telephone and ticket service at Ravinia will be inaugurated on Saturday morning, June 13 at 10 o'clock. Mail orders will be received up to the morning of June 11 by the Ravinia company, 36 S. State street, Chicago. Prospective purchasers who desire to make reservations by mail at this time should address the Ravinia company, 36 S. State street, Chicago, enclosing check payable to the Ravinia company. Subscribers to the guarantee fund are given first call for tickets for the two first nights of the season, and until these have been served, it is impossible to determine what seats will be available for the general public. If mail orders cannot be filled, the money will be refunded.

Chicago patrons wishing to make telephone reservations on or after June 13 may call Hollycourt 2000 without toll, as the line is maintained at the expense of the Ravinia company. Residents of the north shore towns, from Evanston to Waukegan, will call Highland Park 2727. Tickets reserved by telephone must be taken up by 11 o'clock the following morning, or check sent, payable to the Ravinia company, Highland Park, Illinois, by mail, or payment made by Western Union telegraph so as to reach the park at that time, whereupon tickets will be mailed or held, as requested. If reservations are made by telephone on the day of the performance, tickets must be paid for at the park before 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

### Service Charge

Tickets cannot otherwise be held, except upon payment of an annual service charge which gives patrons the privilege of reserving tickets in advance and having them held, except upon payment of an annual service charge which gives patrons the privilege of reserving tickets in advance and having them held until called for. There can be no cancellations or exchanges, nor may patrons enjoying this privilege transfer their rights under this system for the use of others. ## Place Fine Painting of Dinosaur Types on Field Museum Walls

A restoration of grotesque prehistoric reptiles, including the duck-billed dinosaurs, armored dinosaur, and bird-like dinosaurs, in the form of a mural painting 24 feet long, has just been placed on exhibition at Field Museum of Natural History, it was announced today by Stephen C. Simms, director of the museum.

The painting is a gift from Ernest R. Graham, and is one unit of a series of 28 presented by him. It is the work of Charles R. Knight, noted artist.

The painting represents a scene on the eastern slope of the Rocky mountains during the age of reptiles, some 60 million years ago, according to scientific estimates. Dominating the picture are the common type of duck-billed dinosaurs, while not far off are seen other duckbills of different species, known as hooded and crested dinosaurs. A little farther off appear the slender bird-like dinosaurs, resembling ostriches in appearance.

These dinosaurs ranged in size from that of a large crocodile to that of an elephant, states Prof. Elmer S. Riggs, associate curator of paleontology. They flourished in North America at a period when the great planes area had recently been raised above the sea, when the Rocky mountains were new, and when the whole continent enjoyed a semi-tropical climate. Their characteristics have been learned from fossil remains which have been found from Colorado to Alberta.

## Illinois Fire Losses During April Heavy

Illinois fire losses during the month of April were \$1,872,572, according to a report of State Fire Marshal S. L. Legreid just compiled.

The largest loss due to a single cause was \$257,215, due to spontaneous combustion. This caused the fire marshal to urge citizens generally to participate in the spring clean-up campaigns, and to rid their premises of rubbish and unnecessary accumulations of combustible materials.

Other leading causes were: electricity, \$168,317; sparks on roofs, \$80,894; chimneys, \$68,947; exposure, \$66,821.

Dwellings suffered most severely with a loss of \$444,411. Other classes of property which figured high in the loss record were: Stores, \$173,084; schools, \$156,150; barns and stables, \$132,448; mills (saw and planing), \$127,220.

## Highland Park Man Is Robbed in Wisconsin

Nick Larson, a Highland Park resident, was held up June 3, by two bandits who robbed him of \$18 in cash and his keys. The hold-up occurred at about 3:15 a.m. on Highway 41 on the Kenosha side of the state line, near Cross lake.

The bandits forced his automobile off the road with their car, one of them pushed a gun into his side and demanded his money. Following his compliance with this demand, they also relieved him of his car keys and other keys, and made their get-away.
