**230 Students to Get Diplomas
Dr. Gilkey Is Speaker;
to Give Honors**

The annual graduation exercises of the Deerfield-Shields high school will be held this evening, at the school. There are 230 graduates, the largest class in the history of the school. The address will be delivered by the Rev. Charles W. Gilkey, dean of the chapel of the University of Chicago, who will speak on "The tree that owns itself." The school orchestra will play, and the Girls' Glee club will sing. Mrs. Helen Mayer Mannings is conductor of both.

Diplomas will be distributed by George J. McBride, president of the board of education, and medals will be presented to Edward Acomb of Lake Bluff, the valedictorian, and William Sailer of Lake Forest, the salutatorian of the class. The athletic medal will be also presented to the winner, whose name has not been announced.
