

## COMMUNITY GOLF TOURNAMENT HELD

Eighty-nine Take Part Yesterday Afternoon; Mr. Laing Entertains at Dinner

The annual Community Golf tournament at Sunset Valley Golf club was played yesterday afternoon, with eighty-nine entries. The day was ideal, with bright sun and a cool breeze, and the participants had the time of their lives at their favorite sport. Prizes were awarded on blind bogey, lowest gross, lowest net and lowest scores on 9 and 12.

The prize winners are reported as follows:

Low gross in the afternoon tournament was won by Warren Geary, who shot a 72, par for the course. Dick Martin, Big Ten champion, turned in a 73. First blind bogey was split by Bowen Schumacher and Mrs. Solon Reeves. Second blind bogey by K. B. Hansen and Mrs. Charles Elwell, and third was won by B. Rafferty.

Following the tournament Mr. Edward Laing entertained members of the Park board, Mayor E. B. Metzger and a number of friends at a chicken dinner in the club's dining room, following which Mr. Laing gave a talk explaining the activities of the club and the Park district as follows:

Gentlemen:  
On behalf of Sunset Valley Golf club, I welcome you and assure you that it is a great pleasure to have you as our guests tonight. Many of you have been here on similar occasions. Let me say that in your acceptance of this invitation you have honored us greatly.

It is perhaps a fitting time to explain what the Sunset Valley Golf club really is, because many are confused as to the relationship between the Park board and the Golf club. I shall read you a paragraph from our year-book:

"The Sunset Valley Golf club is an organization of resident golfers who assist in the promotion of the game, conducting the tournaments, and act in an advisory capacity to the Park commissioners."
