County Board Removes Bounties on Crows, Etc.

Eager to shave down expenses for the coming year the county board of supervisors last week put several crimps in channels of disbursements in hopes of keeping within its budget.

The bounty on crows, crows eggs and groundhogs was abandoned, as the \$100 offer of rewards for the apprehension of stock and chicken thieves caught in the rural regions.

The board also abandoned temporarily the publishing of the list of patients at the county hospital in the newspapers. This will not be continued, members said, unless privileges are abused at the hospital again.

At the recommendation of the road and bridge committee the board declined to take over and maintain the public beach north of Zion where Frederick H. Bartlett company installed walks, paved roads and a pergola four years ago.

CHINDBLOM OPPOSED

Does Not Agree With Proposal of Mellon to Revive It; Other Schemes

Opposition to the plan of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon in reviving the excise taxes as they existed during and for several years after the war, as a means of increasing the revenue of the nation has been voiced by Congressman Carl R. Chindblom of this district in conferences of the ways and means committee which he is a member.

Mr. Chindblom is the only Illinois Republican on the committee in which all revenue legislation originates.

Agrees on Other Items The Illinois congressman agrees with Secretary Mellon in all of his plans for increasing revenue with the exception of the excise tax.
