

Novarro in Stellar Role in Daybreak

That "Daybreak," should have a truly Continental flavor sowed to be the intention of its producers from the first moment the story was selected. It has been brought to the screen with a Viennese, Dr. Arthur Schnitzler, as author; a Frenchman, Jacques Feyder, as director, and the distinguished young Latin, Ramon Novarro, in the stellar role of Willi Kasda.

To many people Kasda will bring memories of the Novarro triumph in "The Student Prince." Certainly it has been a long time since he has brought to us a young officer of the Teutonic nations before the war. Kasda is a delightful portrait, very different from the Spanish lovers in the two most recent Novarro pictures, "Call of the Flesh" and "In Gay Madrid." Novarro is magnificent in close-fitting uniforms—with a monocle.

Sophisticated Plot

The story is done in the best sophisticated style of Schnitzler, the distinguished author of "The Affairs of Anatol." It is, like Anatol, a tale about a gay love adventurer, but the similarity stops there. The picture starts on a note of gayest comedy and swings through the entire gamut of emotions. It is carried to the very gates of tragedy in fact.

Legislature Beats Woman Jurors Bill

The Illinois house at Springfield late last week killed the measure giving women the right to sit on juries, passed a tax on chain stores, and approved a bill that would force the state to pay the salaries of county judges.

The house voted 76 to 46 in favor of the woman jury bill which made it fall short by one vote of the 77 required to carry a bill in the house.

This ended the fight for this session for a woman jury act.

Once before the assembly provided for women jurors subject to state-wide referendum which was passed, but the supreme court knocked this act out in an opinion that held that the legislature could not delegate its legislative powers to the voters.

The house, by a vote of 130 to 0 approved a tax on chain stores. The bill, if passed by the senate and signed by the governor, would place a tax of \$25 on each of the first three stores in a chain and \$1,000 on each additional store. Violation of this act would carry a penalty of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$5,000.

Things to Cook

As warm days begin to appear, there are many times when we prefer a substantial salad as the main dish for a meal. The following lobster and tuna salad makes just such a salad, or it is delicious to serve for a company luncheon.

For this particular salad I prefer the white tuna fish, using the seven ounce can, and I use the second size of lobster, holding about a cup or a little more.

Lobster and Tuna Salad

- 1 can lobster, about one cup
- 1 can tuna fish—No. 7 size.
- ¼ cup green pepper cut in fine strips
- 3 hard cooked eggs

Mayonnaise

A little lemon juice if wished.

Drain lobster and tuna fish and cut in pieces, not too small. Mix with the green pepper and pimento and add enough oil mayonnaise to moisten well, add a little lemon juice if you wish it a little more tart. Carefully add the egg last, after cutting them in pieces. Do not mix enough to mash the eggs too much.

Line a large shallow salad bowl or plate with crisp lettuce and pile the salad in center. May be served on individual salad plates, if preferred. Place a few fine strips of pimento over the top, with a dash of paprika.
