## Cinema Talk

### George Arliss Gives Secrets of His Rare Zest for Hard Work

Although in his latest picture, "The Millionaire" George Arliss plays the part of an American business man who is ordered to take a rest cure at the age of 60, the actor himself, soon to be 63, has no thought of giving up active work on his own behalf.

With each trip to Hollywood Arliss is questioned at length by an interested public, as to his future plans. He has steadfastly refused to say that he would leave the stage definitely for pictures or that he would make a certain number of pictures and permanently retire.

At 63 Arliss is in many ways a young man. He objects to any suggestion that he has become a veteran of either stage or screen. He plans very definitely to continue both stage and screen work and retirement has not yet entered his future plans.

Although the new picture "The Millionaire" shows Arliss as a man forced to retire for his health, it is the most energetic and humorous picture he has yet made for the talking screen. In it he dons overalls, does hard physical labor and takes a course from two young lovers on how to be happy, though rich. Work, interest in others and a sense of humor Mr. Arliss claims are the three secrets of his own good health.

### "The Finger Points" Big Crime Thriller

The story of a young reporter, his temptation, complication with gangsters and final penalty form the framework of "The Finger Points," the First National production starring Richard Barthelmess. The story was adapted for the screen by John Monk Saunders and W. R. Burnett, and was directed by John Francis Dillon. Fay Wray, Regis Toomey, Clarke Gable, Reborett Elliott and a large cast make up the supporting players. Barthelmess plays the role of the reporter and it is said to be the most daring thing he has ever attempted.

Picture goers who see Gloria Swanson's latest United Artists picture, "Indiscreet," will be agreeably surprised at the tremendous improvement made in sound recording.

This betterment of voice reproduction is due to a new device which for simpler understanding, has been called a "noise reduction valve." Its function is to close automatically between words and phrases or whenever there is no sound impulse travelling through the recording apparatus from the microphones, thus shutting out practically all of the "ground noise" and preventing its being photographed on the film.

With the elimination of the hissing and crackling that has always emanated from "ground noise," the new recording offers a fidelity of tone that is almost startling. It also permits the reproduction of vocal tones in lower registers, such as in whispered conversations, with marked success.

"Indiscreet," a smart comedy-drama produced by De Sylva, Brown and Henderson and directed by Leo McCarey, again reveals Miss Swanson in a role of fashion, with an ultra modern wardrobe to delight the feminine fan. The star's supporting cast includes Ben Lyon, as leading man, Monroe Owsley, Barbara Kent, Arthur Lake and Maude Eburne.

### Jack Holt in Role of Hard Detective

Ever since Jack Holt scored a hit as the hard-boiled detective in Columbia's production of "The Donovan Affair," he has wanted to play another role built upon these same lines. However, this wish was denied him until he was cast for Killian, the Police Inspector in "Subway Express," Columbia's film version of the famous Broadway stage hit by Eva Kay Flint and Martha Madison. In "Subway Express" as in "The Donovan Affair," Holt plays a close-lipped, dominating officer of the law, who by persistent questioning, unravels a baffling murder mystery and again the well known Fred Kelsey acts as his foil in the role of the "dumb dick."
