

FLOWER GUILD WANTS DONATIONS FOR SICK

Each year the work of the Chicago guild has grown. In 1926, it had one receiving booth at Northwestern station, opposite Gate No. 16. In 1927, another was opened at Union station. In 1928 a booth was set up in the lobby of the Peoples Gas building.

1930 saw four new receiving stations — at La Salle street, Illinois Central, Randolph street; the Aurora-Elgin terminal and Commonwealth Edison building. At Northwestern station flowers are distributed Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday to 27 charities. Contributions may be left by the commuter or sent in by clubs between 7:30 and 10:30 a.m. The flowers, fruit and vegetables and jelly are hurried that same morning to scheduled infant welfare clinics, visiting nurse stations

homes and hospitals, where nurses are expecting them and are waiting to carry them out into the forlorn places which they visit.

Season for Giving

The season extends from "Lilac week" in May to October. While the guild is largely dependent on the Garden clubs to collect and deliver flowers, fruit and vegetables to its booth, we have no idea of draining the gardens of anyone. If each Garden club or Woman's club or the group contributing will appoint a guild chairman and give her a large committee, not necessarily all members of her club, each member of the committee can act as a clearing house for her neighborhood. There are estimated 100,000 fruit and vegetable gardens in Chicago without a few flowers, or a sick baby without fresh vegetables. Together with your flowers this year, we earnestly ask you to send green vegetables and fruit. No garden is too small to contribute something.
