PIONEER RESIDENT PASSES ON, THURSDAY

Services for Mrs. Philip R. Hole are Held Sunday; Interment in Deerfield Cemetery

Mrs. Philip R. Hole passed away Thursday evening at her home on Deerfield avenue at the age of 85 years and 9 months.

Elizabeth Caroline Close was born in Rockland (now Lake Bluff) on Oct. 5, 1845, a daughter of John and Elizabeth Dietrich Close, who came from Herzogum Nassau, Germany with their family, to America in 1836. They had 12 children; only one, Benjamin J. Close of Glendale, Calif. now survives.

Lizzie Close was married March 26, 1863 to Mr. Philip Hole, who came to Deerfield from England in 1845. Mr. and Mrs. Hole had nine children, five of whom are living: Mrs. Fred Meyer (Lulu), Mrs. Ira Gardner (Katie), and Ira Hole of Deerfield, Samuel Hole of Shelby, Mont. and Benjamin V. Hole of Burlingame, Calif. One daughter, Mrs. Bert Easton (Jessie) passed away in 1920.

Mrs. Hole was a charter member of the Deerfield Presbyterian church, which was organized May 13, 1876 and taught a class in the Sunday school until she was 75 years of age. The number of young men and women in the village who listened to her exposition of the Bible on Sundays, would make a long list of mature men and women living here and in other places.

Mrs. Hole came as a bride in 1863 to the little house just east of the house in which she has lived since 1905, living for 68 years in those two houses. Mr. Hole purchased the 20 acres surrounding those houses in 1862 at \$11 an acre. Mr. Hole who was born in 1823 passed away in 1901.

When she was a child Mrs. Hole was very delicate and did not at-

tend school longer than six months in her entire life. This was spread over two winter sessions when she lived with her married sister, and attended the Port Clinton school. In spite of this lack of formal education

Mrs. Hole's writing is very beautiful, and would put to shame that of many college graduates. For years she was Deerfield correspondent for the Waukegan Gazette, belonged to our Athenian club and upon frequent occasions of importance composed poems that she has delivered in public. Several years ago at a missionary meeting in Highland Park she recited from memory her most beloved poem: "My Bible, how I love it. It's the treasure of my heart."

One of the beauty spots of Deerfield which should be a park is the small tract of land remaining from the Hole farm east of the Deerfield station. Some of the oaks in the original forest, through which the railroad tracks run in 1871, are still remaining. The most beautiful specimen is the single tree standing west of the tracks that was a big tree fifty years ago. It is now owned by Miss Jewett.

Mrs. Hole is survived by five children, 21 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren, (one great grandchild, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Page was born the day of her funeral).

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, July 5, at the Presbyterian church with interment at the Deerfield cemetery. Rev. M. J. Andrews officiated. Mrs. Hole's six grandsons acted as pall bearers.

Mrs. Louis F. Bader and her daughter, Miss Constance Bader, who have been visiting Rear Admiral and Mrs. W. S. Crosley at Great Lakes, have returned to their home in Dover, Mass. Mrs. Ellis N. Talbott, of Richmond, Virginia, remains at Great Lakes as a house guest in the Commandant's House.
