

## TIMELY SUGGESTIONS FOR BATHERS GIVEN

### Life Guard on Local Beach Offers Good Advice for Swimmers

At the four beaches operated by the Highland Park East Board, life guards are provided for the protection of the public using the bathing beaches. The beaches are located at Central avenue, Park avenue, Ravine drive, and Roger Williams avenue, Highland Park.

William Rice, Jr., the guard stationed at Central Park beach, offers the following suggestions to users of the beaches:

First, children under 6 years of age should not enter the water to greater than waist depth unless accompanied by an adult, and non-swimming adults are cautioned not to enter the water to more than shoulder depth.

Second, under certain weather conditions a strong undertow exists along the lake shore; it would therefore be well for bathers to inquire of the guard as to the conditions prevailing if they are not familiar with them.

Third, the life guard will warn the bathers by blowing a whistle when they exceed the limits of safety in the water. Bathers should be guided by the judgment of the life guard in their use of bathing beaches.

Fourth, persons desiring to take unusually long distance swims should at all times be accompanied by a boat.

#### For Swimmers

Following are a few important suggestions that should be observed by swimmers:

Wait at least two hours after a meal before bathing.

Always have someone accompany you, never swim alone.
