When the judging was completed, a special drill with Japanese lanterns was presented by the Ravinia group, under the direction of Howard Copp. The children who carried lanterns were given pop and candy, and the evening was topped off with the sending up of four hot-air balloons, two seven feet in diameter, and two ten feet. They were released by Ray Cox.

### Prize Winners

The prizes were awarded, in the Sunset group, first to Jerry McCaffrey; second, Olive Lindstrom; third, Jean Moroney; fourth, Evelyn Humer. For the Lincoln Park division the prizes went to Irene Sienert, first; second, Marilyn Mooney; third, Ethel Ohrmund; fourth, Jane Lazard.

In the Ravinia group Judith Greenberg won first prize; John McIntosh and Junior Copeland were second; third, Mary Amendola; fourth, Donald Moffet. Peter Sinclair was awarded first prize from Port Clinton; second prize went to Tommy Brown and Thomas Weigel; third, Shirley Bartlett; and fourth, Olive Devendorf. In the West Ridge group Mary Krumbach won first, Marguerite Jackson won second, although Robert Mansell was carrying her lantern; Jane Griffith won third, and Dorothy Teberg won fourth, with Frederick Dexheimer carrying her lantern.

The special prizes were awarded to Linda Rollery, of Lincoln, first; Bar-

bara Garst, second; Elmer Hargrave, third; and Yolanda Gurioli, fourth.

### Grand Prize

The first grand prize was awarded to Lincoln playground, for a beautiful Japanese pagoda display, pulled on a wagon, with strands of lighted lanterns spreading out from it. The wagon was pulled by George McLellan and Paul Buller. Ravinia won second grand prize, awarded, in the name of Ravinia, to Judith Greenberg. The third grand prize went to Mary Krumbach, for West Ridge; fourth was awarded to Port Clinton, and fifth to Sunset. Sunset had by far the largest number of lanterns, but the display of some of the other playgrounds were excellently put together. All in all, the whole parade represented much work and skill in handiwork.

At seven o'clock, before the parade, a baseball game was played between two National league teams, Sunset and Lincoln. Lincoln won the game by a score of 10-3, although Sunset made a desperate attempt to score in the last innings.

Mr. Edward M. Laing, superintendent of parks, was present at the parade, and is in a large way responsible for the success of the evening.
