Benefit Performance Proceeds to Ravinia Auditorium Upkeep

The benefit performances of "Father Time's Calendar" by the dance pupils of Mildred Haessler this spring resulted in a net addition of \$16.10 to the Ravinia Auditorium maintenance fund, in addition to \$35 rent paid for the use of the auditorium by the dancers. It was the fourth annual presentation by this group.

She is also teaching dancing this month at Manumit, a progressive school located in the country about 65 miles north of New York City. Nellie Seeds, director of the school, addressed the Ravinia Woman's club last winter on progressive education in America and abroad.
