## TAX LEVY ORDINANCE HAS FIRST READING

### Carries Total of \$395,070; Other Ordinances Passed

At the regular session of the city council Monday evening the annual tax levy ordinance was read and filed for inspection. It carries a total of \$397,370 to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year. It probably will be acted on at the next meeting.

The ordinance limiting the installation, operation and maintenance of gasoline pumps in streets and parkways to one for each 75 feet of frontage and prohibiting installation, etc., after two years, was passed on final reading. It was introduced at the last meeting.

The ordinance regulating and licensing the cleaning of catch basins, presented at the last session, was passed on final reading.

The bill of Joseph Cabonargi in the sum of \$30.60 for additional charge on the five per cent maintenance retained by the city under his contract on the new city hall building was approved and ordered paid.

A communication from the Library board requesting the city council to issue tax anticipatory warrants against the library building fund was ordered placed on file.
