

JAMES SIMPSON, JR. OUT FOR CONGRESS

Announces Candidacy in
New 13th; Son of Field
& Co. Official

James Simpson, Jr., of Wadsworth, son of the chairman of the board of Marshall Field & Company, last Friday announced his candidacy for congress in the 13th district, which includes Lake and a portion of Cook counties outside of Chicago.

Simpson, a tyro in politics, startled the old guard through Lake county with his announcement, and some of them gave him more than an even

chance of piling up a vote that will mean something in the nominations. The candidate is but 26 years old, but has been a student in political science and social and economic subjects.

Was Lake Forest Student

Simpson, who was born in the district and attended schools at Winnetka and Lake Forest and later Harvard university has the following to say:

"I believe that every citizen should exercise his political prerogative as a citizen and give time and thought to our governmental affairs.

"My study of social and economic subjects and political science leads me to the conclusion that nothing would give me greater satisfaction

than to give all my time, all my attention, and all the energy I am capable of giving, to the interest and well-being of the men, women and children of the 13th congressional district of Illinois, as their representative in the house of representatives," he wrote.

"I, therefore, hereby announce my candidacy for the republican nomination for member of congress from the 13th Congressional district, and shall immediately begin an active campaign in every precinct in the district. I shall present to the voters of the 13th district my views on the questions that confront the people for solution and shall make my stand known on these questions without equivocation.

Makes Several Promises

"If nominated and elected as member of congress, I shall maintain an office in the 13th Congressional district as well as in Washington in order to be readily accessible to those whom I am serving.

"It is my belief that our economic, social and political conditions are in such urgent need of attention that every public official who holds office, and who is charged with grave responsibility, should attend strictly and exclusively to the business of the office to which he was elected and not neglect his duties for the performance of which he draws public pay, nor use the power of the office which he holds to secure and additional office.

"I hold no public office and if the voters of the 13th Congressional district nominate and elect me as their member of congress, I pledge that I will seek no other public office while serving in congress," Simpson wrote.

Miss Lola Perkins of Indianapolis, Ind., was the guest of her sister, Mrs. Laura Howard, of the Udell apartments a few days this week.

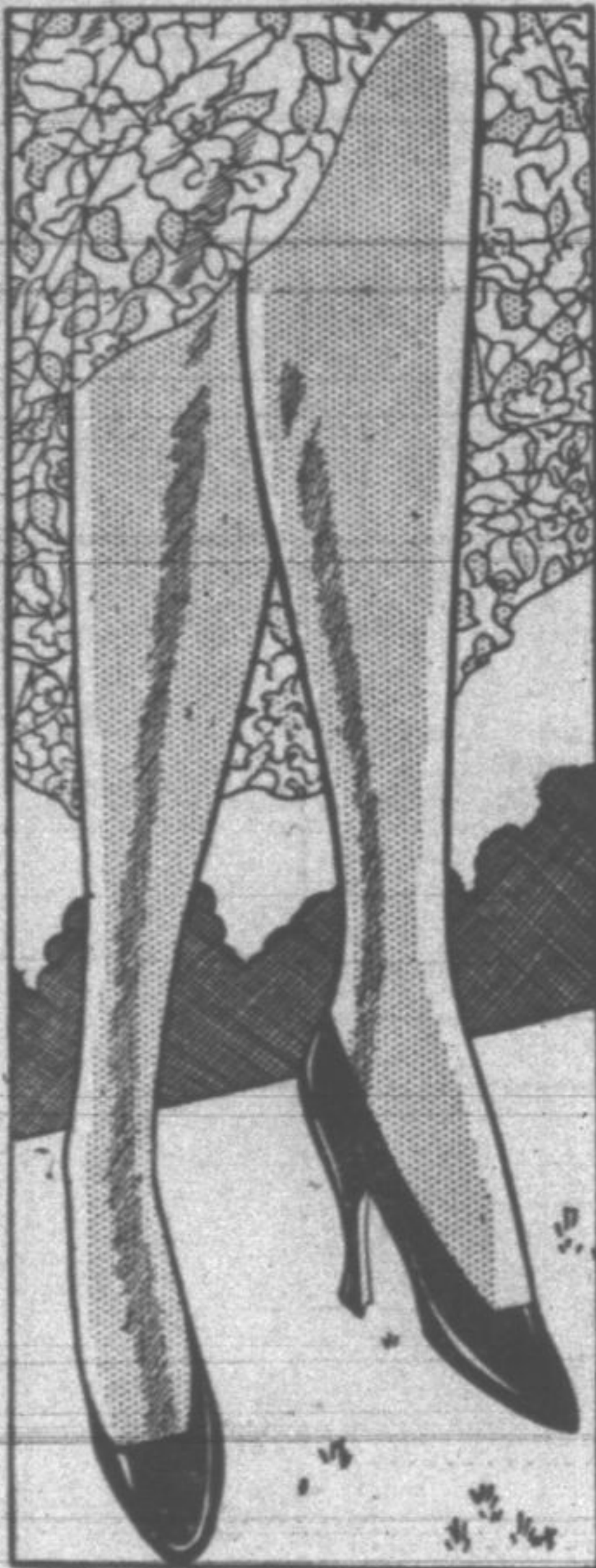
Miss Catherine Rouse of Chicago, formerly of this city, underwent an operation for appendicitis yesterday morning at the St. Francis hospital in Evanston.
