Two new and fascinating stories of this type for young readers are, "Little Tooktoo" by Peary, and "Wallie the Walrus" by Wiese. Little Tooktoo is Santa's youngest reindeer. Of course we all know, "Now Dasher,

now Dancer, now Prancer, and Vixen." Wel, Tooktoo is also the nephew of this famous "Prancer," and in this story we are told how Santa and his reindeer live away up North. As for Tooktoo's very own adventure,—well, you must read that for yourself.

"Wallie the walrus" is a book every little child will want to own. Not only does the author write a simple and attractive story of the little walrus who was born in the spring just after the polar ice broke, he also accompanies his tale with colored crayon illustrations which are equally attractive and important.

Herbert Hoover

Boys who wish to be up-to-the-minute in their reading will welcome this well-written volume on the life of the president, "Boy's life of Herbert Hoover" by Charnley. The author portrays Mr. Hoover's boyhood, traces his successful career as a mining engineer in Australia and presents in an alert manner, his splendid work during the World war.

Loud Sing Cuckoo

Occasionally a wholesome historical story finds its way into the department for boys and girls, a tale not written down for young readers, based on fact, and withal told in charming manner. Had we been given any choice in the matter, "Loud Sing Cuckoo" by Sterne would have

been our selection for the Newbery medal.

It is a tale of England when Edward III held sway, and when heavy and exorbitant taxes were sapping the very blood of the common people. The reader is given a vivid picture on the one hand, of chivalry, knights and ladies, life at court, and on the other, of utter squalor and wretchedness. Moreover, with Chaucer riding through the pages could there be aught but romance? If we were an "older boy or girl" we should take "Loud Sing Cuckoo" and read it from cover to cover without delay. Because of its attractive format, it also makes a lovely book for gifts.

Gobins, Oh My!

And now we have another collection of wonder tales, this time from Germany, by the same person who has compiled "Wonder tales from Windmill and" and "Wonder tales from China Seas." This new collection "Wonder Tales from Goblin Hills," contains stories of goblins, dwarfs and nixies, stories from the Black Forest, the Rhine and Saxony. Miss Olcott is a member of the Folk Lore society, and was formerly lecturer on Folk Lore and Mythology at the Carnegie library of Pittsburgh.

Jungles of Yucatan

"Yucatan lies only two days across the Mexican Gulf from New Orleans. Here the Mayan civilization rose to its heights.—Here lie the white cities with their beautifully carved records of the passage of time, the movements of sun and stars, the panoply of gods and warriors.— Now that "Lindy" has charted the sky course perhaps you'll go down and fly over them, fly over jungles that it takes weeks and

months on muleback to penetrate." This is what Alida S. Malkus writes in the introduction to her latest book for older girls and boys, "The Dark Star of Itza." It is the story of Chichen Itza, one of the lost cities of the jungle, in the days of its vast wealth and splendor, and of the pagan princess Nichte, daughter of the high priest. It is heartily recommended for both boys and girls who are looking for something interesting, yet different.
