AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND LICENSE THE CLEANING OF CATCH BASINS LOCATED ON PRIVATE PROPERTY AND CONNECTED WITH THE SEWER SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1: That the Mayor shall from time to time, and upon application approved by the Commissioner of Public Health and Safety, grant a license to any person, firm or corporation to clean, remove and dispose of waste matter from catch basins located on private property and connected with the sewer system in the City of Highland Park, in the manner hereinafter stated.

SECTION 2: No person, firm or corporation shall be permitted to clean, remove and dispose of waste matter from catch basins located on private property and connected with the sewer system in the City of Highland Park without first having obtained a license so to do under a penalty of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offence; provided that any person desiring to clean, remove and dispose of waste matter from his catch basin on his own premises may do so without a license.

SECTION 3: Every person, firm or corporation applying for such license shall pay annually to the City Collector the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for such license and shall execute a bond to the City of Highland Park in the penal sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) with not less than two sureties, to be approved by the Commissioner of Public Health and Safety, conditioned that such licensee shall comply with all of the provisions of any ordinance of the City now in force, or which the Council may hereafter ordain, regulating the cleaning, removal and disposal of such waste matter from such catch basins.

SECTION 4: The waste matter taken or removed from catch basins, as described in Section 1 of this Ordinance, shall under no circumstances, be disposed of or placed in any place within the City except on the public dump. An application for a license under this ordinance shall state what method of disposal and the place thereof proposed by the applicant and the license shall be granted only upon the approval of the application by the Commissioner of Public Health and Safety, and consent may be revoked at any time for any violation of the ordinance of the City of Highland Park.

SECTION 5: That no waste matter from any catch basin shall be conveyed through any street, avenue, alley or public place within the City of Highland Park unless conveyed in a vehicle constructed with tight compartments so covered as to prevent the spilling or waste of such matter or emitting odors therefrom.

SECTION 6: This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval, publication and recording.
