Be it ordained by the City Council of the

SECTION 1: That the Mayor shall from time to time, and upon application approved by the Commissioner of Public Health and Safety grant a license to any person, firmor corporation to clean, remove and dispose of waste matter from catch basins located on sewer system in the City of Highland Park, in the manner hereinafter stated.

SECTION 2: No person, firm or corporation shall be permitted to clean, remove and dispose of waste matter from catch basins with the sewer system in the City of Highland Park without first having obtained a offence; provided that any person desiring to the opportunity to receive instruc- clean, remove and dispose of waste matter from his catch basin on his own premises may

do so without a license.
