

# FLOWER SHOW AUG. 15

Splendid Display Planned at Woman's Club Saturday of Next Week

The Flower Show of the Highland Park Garden Study club will be the meeting place of flower lovers of the north shore on Saturday, August 15 at the Highland Park Woman's club. From 1 to 9 o'clock, gladiolus fans will get together and discuss their favorites while viewing their neighbors' choicest varieties. Novices will come to see the newer things they've read about and to ask experienced growers "how you do it?"

Many Classes There will be classes for all flowers in bloom at the time, annuals and

perennials, and there is a splendid list of medals and prizes to be awarded, besides the ribbons for first, second, and third places in each class.

The American Gladiolus society is cooperating with the local club and offering its silver medal as a Sweepstakes prize in the gladiolus division, its bronze medal for second place in the Sweepstakes, and another silver medal for the competitor who has never before exhibited in a gladiolus show and who enters the greatest number of classes in the gladiolus division with creditable results.

#### Notable Honor

It is believed that this is the only local show in the state to be thus honored by the American Gladiolus society, although the show of the Illinois Gladiolus society receives cooperation of course.

There are merchadise prizes in the gladiolus division and also in the division for annuals and perennials. There are classes for single spikes, for collections, and for flower arrangements of various kinds as well as for plant stands and card tables set for a "Hardtimes" bridge supper, and the contrasting class for the "return-to-prosperity" bridge supper.
