**Fail to Find Clues in
Death of Game Warden
Believed Murder Victim**

Barren of clues, and with no suspects in custody, McHenry county officials are continuing their investigation of the murder of Charles W. Eldredge, 64, state game warden and for years a leading factor in repub-

lican politics in the district.

Three Chicagoans, grilled last week, were released after a few hours after they convinced Sheriff Lester Edinger that Eldredge simply had halted them at Lake Villa June 14 for the examination of fishing licenses, one of which was taken up because it was improperly filled out.

The men, John Wersching, Michael and Nick Andree, told the sheriff that Wersching's license was taken up by the veteran game warden and that he wrote him a permit to fish until he could make a new application for a valid license. Wersching's permit was found in the dead man's coat pocket.

All theories of suicide were discarded when a minute examination disclosed no powder burns on the clothes or body.
