County Conserved Too Much of His Money in His Lifetime Is Claim

The late George Hines, Highland Park, knew he had been given a bad deal by the county when he lay on his deathbed.

Hines was what an earlier generation called a spendthrift. He was alone in the world and he had some money saved so he devised means of dissipating it while life lasted. Some of it, reports say, was squandered in cool saloons of the county, accord-

ing to the Herald and Examiner. Then the government stepped in. Fearing that Hines would eventually become a charge on the county, the County Court appointed a conservator some years ago, to dole out Hines' stored-up money to him in reasonable amounts.

In this way the county saw Hines to the end of his days. A final report of his estate approved by Judge Martin Decker in Probate Court yesterday revealed that Hines, the spendthrift who wanted to die with his last dollar well spent, leaves \$3,000 and no heirs. The money will be held by the county treasurer until claimants appear.
