The boys were in Highland Park again in time for supper. They were accompanied by Mr. Copp, Pete Grimson, Tillie Martin, and Fritz Silber.

Peace Caravan Visits Highland Park Tuesday

About 30 autos, with license plates of numerous western states, carrying women members of the "peace caravan" which is moving across the nation collecting signatures for a petition asking disarmament, was met at the Wisconsin-Illinois state line Tuesday morning by delegations from Waukegan and other North Shore communities, including Highland Park and Ravinia, and escorted into the city.

The caravan stopped for a short time near the city hall where several talks were made by proponents of the project, and while the speeches were in progress members of the caravan and sympathizers solicited signatures to the petition being carried by the party. It is expected that many thousands of names will be signed by the time the caravan reaches Washington to present the petition to President Hoover.
