Careful Selection Is Vital in Purchase of Automatic Oil Heater

The comfort, leisure and general satisfaction derived from an automatic oil heating plant in the home will depend largely upon careful selection and proper installation.

When the homeowner decides that oil heat is modern, and contemplates purchase of an oil burner, he should give attention first to selecting one best suited to his particular installation. The choice should be prompted by the part that it is going to play in the comfort, cleanliness and convenience of home life.

Size of the house, together with its present heating system, should first be given consideration.

If a neighbor owns an oil burner which he swears by, don't necessarily pattern your installation after his. Your house might be larger, have a different heating system and call for an altogether different type or size of burner.

Utilization of extra cellar space given by an oil burner must be kept in mind as it may decide whether the burner is to be of the outside or inside type. Preference may be governed by conditions in your particular installation. The converted basement has many possibilities.

Coach Peel Talks to Highwood Boys' Club, Tells War Experience

At the regular meeting of the Highwood Boys club, which was held at St. James church, Coach J. A. Peel gave a very interesting talk on some of his experiences as an ambulance driver during the World war.

He told of his training at an ambulance camp located at Allentown, Pa., where 5,000 men were stationed and of his trip across the ocean. Sixteen ships, sailing four-abreast and carrying approximately 60,000 men, made the trip. Off the Irish coast the ships were met by 21 submarine destroyers, which accompanied them to Liverpool, England. In England they stayed in a rest camp about two weeks and were sent on to France.

Coach Peel was overseas eighteen and one-half months. After the war he returned to school and received his degree from the University of Illinois. During the war he was fortunate enough to have the opportunity and spent some time in England, Ireland, Scotland and France.

He finished his talk by explaining the true meaning of sportsmanship and how character training was received from participating in properly supervised athletics.
