

NORTHWESTERN GRID SCHEDULE PROSPECTS

Two Intersectional Games Included; Nebraska and California; Dates

Two intersectional games, Nebraska and University of California at Los Angeles, mark Northwestern university's football team's schedule this fall, according to reports from Evanston. Neither of these teams have ever been on the Wildcat's schedule before. The Cornhuskers open the season Oct. 3 and U. C. L. A. is slated for Oct. 17.

Coach Dick Hanley who has a penchant for tough schedules appears to have constructed a masterpiece for 1931. The so-called practice games which usually occupy the first two dates on the schedule have been discarded by the Wildcat mentor in favor of tougher competition.

Nebraska First

Nebraska's husky gridders from the cornbelt will provide the curtain raiser at Dyche stadium and will be followed a week later by Notre Dame's national champions in a game to be staged at Soldier Field in Chicago. Playing teams of this caliber in one-two order at the opening of the season is a radical departure in football schedule making.

The remainder of the schedule requires that the Wildcats be on their toes since no breathing spell has been provided. After Notre Dame comes U. C. L. A., a team which has come rapidly to the front in Pacific coast football circles during the past several years. The Bruins have a fine squad of veterans back this year and will be keyed to make something of an impression when they invade the Dyche stadium for their intersectional clash with the Wildcats.

Hard Schedule

Following the game with the Pacific coast eleven the Purple opens its Big Ten season against Ohio State at Columbus on Oct. 24. On successive week-ends, then, will be games with Illinois at Evanston, Minnesota at Evanston, Indiana at Evanston, and Iowa at Iowa City.

The others injured were Tom Lyons of Grayslake, driver of the second car, his wife, and two children. They were treated at the St. Therese hospital.

SUBURBAN AREA IN BUILDING INCREASE

Straus Report Indicates Slight Gains for July; Totals in the Several Towns

The building volume in the Chicago suburban area showed a substantial increase during July as compared with July 1930 and June 1931 according to the survey covering 33 towns, issued by S. W. Straus & Co. The value of the building permits issued for July 1931 was \$3,535,983 as against \$2,404,785 for July 1930 and \$2,636,800 for June 1931.

Of the 33 towns represented 14 showed gains in the July comparison, Berwyn and Cicero were the leaders with gains of 505 per cent, Evanston was next with a gain of 315 per cent, followed by Glen Ellyn with 126 per cent. Other communities showing gains were Libertyville, Hammond, Winnetka, Villa Park, Wilmette, Mount Prospect, Niles Center, Hinsdale, Elmwood Park and Aurora.

In the comparison between July 1931 and June 1931, 16 communities showed gains, Mount Prospect being the leader with 2,518 per cent followed by Berwyn with 2,200 per cent, Cicero, 1,122 per cent, and Hammond with 684 per cent. Other towns showing gains were Aurora, Des Plaines, Dolton, Evanston, Geneva, Highland Park, Hinsdale, Hammond, Libertyville, Oak Park, Wilmette and East Chicago.

WELL KNOWN NAMES IN ILLINOIS SQUAD

University's Football Players Include Many Prep School Stars this Year

Followers of prep activities in Illinois the past few years will find many familiar names in the University of Illinois football roster which lists the most promising members of last year's freshman squad, says a report from Urbana.

That these youngsters will give the 14 returning lettermen a hard battle for positions is accepted as a certainty by critics who watched the burly youths fight the varsity to a standstill in many scrimages last fall.

The name of Dave Cook is a byword with fans in and about St. Louis who watched this husky and fleet halfback flash to fame when he played with Soldan high, city champions in 1929. Dave is a son of Jimmy Cook, who three decades ago won four football letters at Illinois and was one of the best ends of his time. Dave, a six-footer who weighs 200 pounds but can move, looks like the answer to the coach's prayer.

Other Prep Athletes

Then there is Bob Torsley, diminutive and stocky quarterback from Mattoon who as a high school player wrecked many Big Twelve teams' aspirations with his bullet-like passes. Playing against Horsley in Big Twelve competition but now a teammate on the Illini squad is Al Hall, Champaign boy who demonstrated as a freshman that he will make a strong bid for a regular halfback position.

From Moline, on the banks of the Mississippi, comes three husky sophomore aspirants. Thomas "Casey" Straw, center, one of the best players to wear the colors of Moline high, Cliff Hyink, a 192-pound tackle with an equally imposing prep record, and Mauritz Ringquist, 240-pound candidate, all were coached by "Gigs" Senneff, old time Illinois back.

From Northern Illinois

The northern part of the state will send down some men of promise in Herman Wulser, a halfback from Elgin; Sam Gorenstein, scrappy guard from Senn high, Chicago; Ivan Schustek, a lanky 182-pound end from Chicago; and Charles Damit, guard, from Brookfield.

Other familiar names are those of the Kam twins of Atwood, Albert G. and Alfred J., tackles; Raymond Horn, 200-pound tackle from Salem; Monroe Glick, 207-pound tackle from Pana; Ed Schalk, guard from Champaign, and Lex Bullock, son of Varsity Trainer Mat Bullock, center from Urbana.
