Three Auto Accidents in Deerfield Thursday

Three automobile accidents happened while Police Officer Chester Wolf was on night duty, Thursday evening.

Two occurred at the Deerfield main corners and the third was near Point Comfort, north of Deerfield. The most serious accident of the three was a collision of Tommy O'Neil's car with a North Western Motor coach about two o'clock Friday morning.

Tommy O'Neil and Henry Bruno, both of Deerfield, backed out onto Waukegan road in front of Fehr's restaurant and were struck by the North Western motor coach 447, driven by Howard Moore of 1137 Grace street, Chicago. The bus was returning from Minneapolis and carried fourteen passengers. No one in the bus was seriously injured, but both local men were rushed to the Highland Park hospital in an ambulance and Dr. Davis and Dr. Sugden were called.

The bus was damaged and at five o'clock another bus was sent out from Chicago and took the passengers to their destination.

Mr. O'Neil received a head wound, broken ribs and possible internal injuries, but Mr. Bruno's injuries, several fractures and internal ruptures were very much more serious, and it was reported that he was in a very critical condition.

Another automobile accident occurred the following evening near the County Line road and two women were injured.

Deerfield Men Injured When Bus Smashes Car

Thomas O'Neil and Henry Bruno, Deerfield, were severely injured early Friday when O'Neil's car was struck by a North Western Line bus southbound to Chicago from Minneapolis. Howard Moore, driver of the bus, was not held, and he and fourteen passengers escaped injury.

According to witnesses O'Neil backed his car out from a restaurant shortly after 1 a. m. and started to cross Waukegan road directly in the path of the bus. Both his car and the bus were wrecked, and the passengers continued in a relief car after three hours' delay.

The injured men were rushed to Highland Park hospital, where their injuries were treated by Dr. C. J. Davis of Deerfield. Bruno incurred a fractured femur, fractured pelvis, ruptured bladder and perforated intestine. His condition is grave. O'Neil's injuries were minor, with the exception of possible internal injuries.
