County Highway Project Finished in Three Years Is Now Belief

Probability that the county highway program under the \$12,500,000 bond issue, will be completed next year is the prospect held out by R. M. Lobdell, county superintendent of highways.

The highway department had expressed the opinion two years ago that from three to four years would be needed, but at the present rate of progress but three years will be necessary.

Eight and one-half miles of pavement were completed a year ago, and twelve miles either are completed or under construction this year. About seven miles of improvement will remain for next year, it was explained.

When the system is completed the county will have 34½ miles in addition to the state system.

Exonerate Bus Line of Blame in Death

A coroner's jury absolved the Northwestern bus line of blame for the death of Henry Bruno, Deerfield, who died of injuries received last week when an auto in which he was riding was struck by an oncoming bus.

Thomas O'Neil, driver of the automobile, has recovered from his injuries.

According to the testimony of Chester Wolf, Deerfield night policeman, the O'Neil car backed onto the highway when the traffic lights were with the bus.

Hold Up Contract on Fort Sheridan Road

Letting of contracts to construct a new road through Fort Sheridan is being held up by protests from downstate communities filed with the state highway department against the metropolitan area wage scale.

Directors of Highways Cleveland stopped contract letting in the Chicago area when Alexander, Union and Johnson counties protested that the high wage scale was unfair to them. The Chicago area, downstate contends, is the only section which can get its work completed.
