

CHINDBLOM ANNOUNCES CONGRESS CANDIDACY

To the Voters in the New 13th Congressional District; Election April 12

To the voters in the (new) 13th Congressional district:

I will be a candidate, in the Primary election next April, for the Re-



publican nomination for Representative in Congress in the 13th Congressional district as created by the congressional reapportionment act passed by the Illinois legislature last June. This district will consist of the city of Evanston and the towns of New Trier, Niles, Northfield, Wheeling, Elk Grove, Palatine, Schaumburg, Barrington, Hanover, Maine, Norwood Park, and Leyden in Cook county, and all of Lake county. More than three-fourths of the population in this territory has been in the (old) 10th Congressional district in which I have been elected to Congress since November 1918. I feel that the very generous support which I have received in that portion of the old Tenth district which is now in the 13th district amply justifies my candidacy in the new district and I hope the new portions of that district will find me deserving of their favor. I shall therefore submit my candidacy to the Republicans of the 13th district at the Primary election on April 12, 1932.

Beginning October 1st, next my home address will be North Shore hotel, Chicago avenue and Davis street, Evanston, where I shall be pleased to meet constituents and friends who may desire to see me. Since it is my duty to represent all of the people in the present 10th district until the expiration of my present term of office on March 3, 1933, I shall also continue my present congressional office at 1521 Foster avenue, Chicago.

Dedication Ceremony Marks Closing Day at Ft. Sheridan C. M. T. C.

With appropriate military ceremonies, which included the awarding of 320 athletic prizes by Col. Edward Davis, the 1931 C. M. T. camp at Fort Sheridan was concluded Thursday of last week and the camp dedicated to Second Lieut. George Alexander McKinlock, Jr., world war hero and son of Mr. and Mrs. George A. McKinlock of Chicago and Lake Forest.

Mr. McKinlock, the father of Lieut. McKinlock, was in the stand with Col. Davis as a review was given in honor of his son. The following sketch of Lieut. McKinlock's military career was furnished the press:

Lieut. McKinlock was killed during the Aisne-Marne battle on July 21, 1918. Previous to his death he was awarded the Croix de Guerre for gallantry at Cantigny, the Distinguished Service Cross for heroism during an engagement at Bervy-le-Fec and also a citation for gallantry at Polisy.

Lieut. McKinlock, who was a Harvard graduate, left his position at the Central Electric company at the outbreak of the world war and was admitted to the officers' training camp at Fort Sheridan. He received his commission, enlisted in the infantry, and was ordered to France among the first troops to cross the sea. He served as an intelligence officer during the first invasion.

Dorcas Home Holds Informal Tea Today

Dorcas Home for Children, just west of the Briargate Golf club, on Deerfield road, will be visited this afternoon by members of the Dorcas society of the Deerfield Presbyterian church and their guests.

The occasion is an informal tea which Mrs. Jane Ardis Agnew, founder and superintendent of the home, is giving for the church group, which annually contributes to the support of the institution.

Mrs. Agnew started the home in Evanston with only three charges, back in 1914. Four years later the orphanage was moved to its present home in Deerfield, where it has grown until an average of 40 children are cared for.

Although the home is nonsectarian, it is supported largely by north shore church societies and women's clubs in the Tenth District Federation. The Glencoe Union church presented the initial gift to the home.

PARK DIST. RETIRING \$45,000 BONDS SOON

To Be Paid Off This Year, Also Large Interest Sum; Good Progress Made

Maturing bonds of the Highland Park East Park district to the amount of \$45,000 will be retired this year, and interest on other bonded indebtedness will entail payments of \$14,290, according to the report of Edward M. Laing, secretary of the board.

A total of \$87,530 has been appropriated for expenses of the East Park board. Of this sum, \$18,490 will be used for the payment of salaries and wages of officers and employees.

The salary of the secretary and superintendent, Mr. Laing, is \$5,400, while the three employes of his office are paid a total of \$4,680 per annum. The professional golf instructor's salary is \$2,400, and the playground director and his assistants receive \$3,500 annually.

Add Equipment

Added equipment to the park system cost \$1,800 during the year, playground apparatus necessitating the expenditure of most of this money the report shows.

Miscellaneous expenses total \$5950 and an emergency and contingency fund of \$2,000 is set aside for use during the year.

Property owned by the park board is now worth \$1,305,786, although when purchased during the twenty-two years the board has functioned, the cost was only \$765,765, Secretary Laing told the board at its most recent meeting.

Large Acreage

In proportion to population, Laing contends, the acreage of the park system in perhaps the greatest in the state. The 280 acres of parks provides 23 1/2 acres per 1,000 of population.

Recreation activities are carried on during the summer at five playgrounds, three bathing beaches, a golf course and several tennis courts.
