Funeral services for William Monroe Wright, noted turiman and retired president of the Calumet Baking Powder company, who died in his home in Lexington, Ky., on Thursday of last week were held at 10:30 a. m. Monday at the chapel in the Rosehill cemetery. Mr. Wright was 87 years old and formerly lived in Highland Park.

Mr. Wright was born in Dayton, O., and became a traveling salesman and relatives for their sympathy and at the age of 20. In 1892 he founded the Calumet company here. He floral offerings sent during our reretired from active business 15 years cent bereavement. ago and was succeeded as president or the company by his son, Warren pd Wright, president of the Lincoln Park board. When in Chicago he resided at 937 Castlewood terrace.

On retiring from business Mr. Wright realized his ambition of becoming the leading breeder of harness horses in the country. His Calumet farm, five miles west of Lexington, is one of the show places of Kentucky. It embraces several hundred acres and represents an investment of more than a million dollars. It was there that Mr. Wright bred and trained Peter Manning, the all-time trotting champion. Mr. Wright died without knowing that his prize trotter, Calumet Butler, won the \$60,000 ing's richest prize, earlier in the. month at New York. He is survived by his widow, Georgia, and their son, Warren.
