

Sixty-Cent Shoes Make Tariff Opponents Sick; Are Being Imported

Before Congress met last year we talked with a large shoe manufacturer who was opposed to a high tariff on shoes. It was his contention that such action might precipitate a high tariff on hides and in that event the shoe man would lose more than if he had to fight for local business against foreign importations.

Maybe that was sound reasoning, but in view of the tremendous influx of foreign-made footwear it would appear that the shoe industry needs not only high tariff protection but an embargo as well.

One Bata, nemesis of the shoe manufacturer in the low price field, in a recent interview declared that his tremendous plants in Czechoslovakia would soon be turning out women's shoes to retail in this country at 60 cents a pair. That is a trade item for shoe manufacturers and shoe

workers who oppose a high tariff to conjure with.

In the United States the labor cost alone of a typical pair of shoes is more than 60 cents.

Chain stores have for some time been selling boys' shoes around 60 cents a pair, that are imported from Bata's factories.—Industry and Labor.

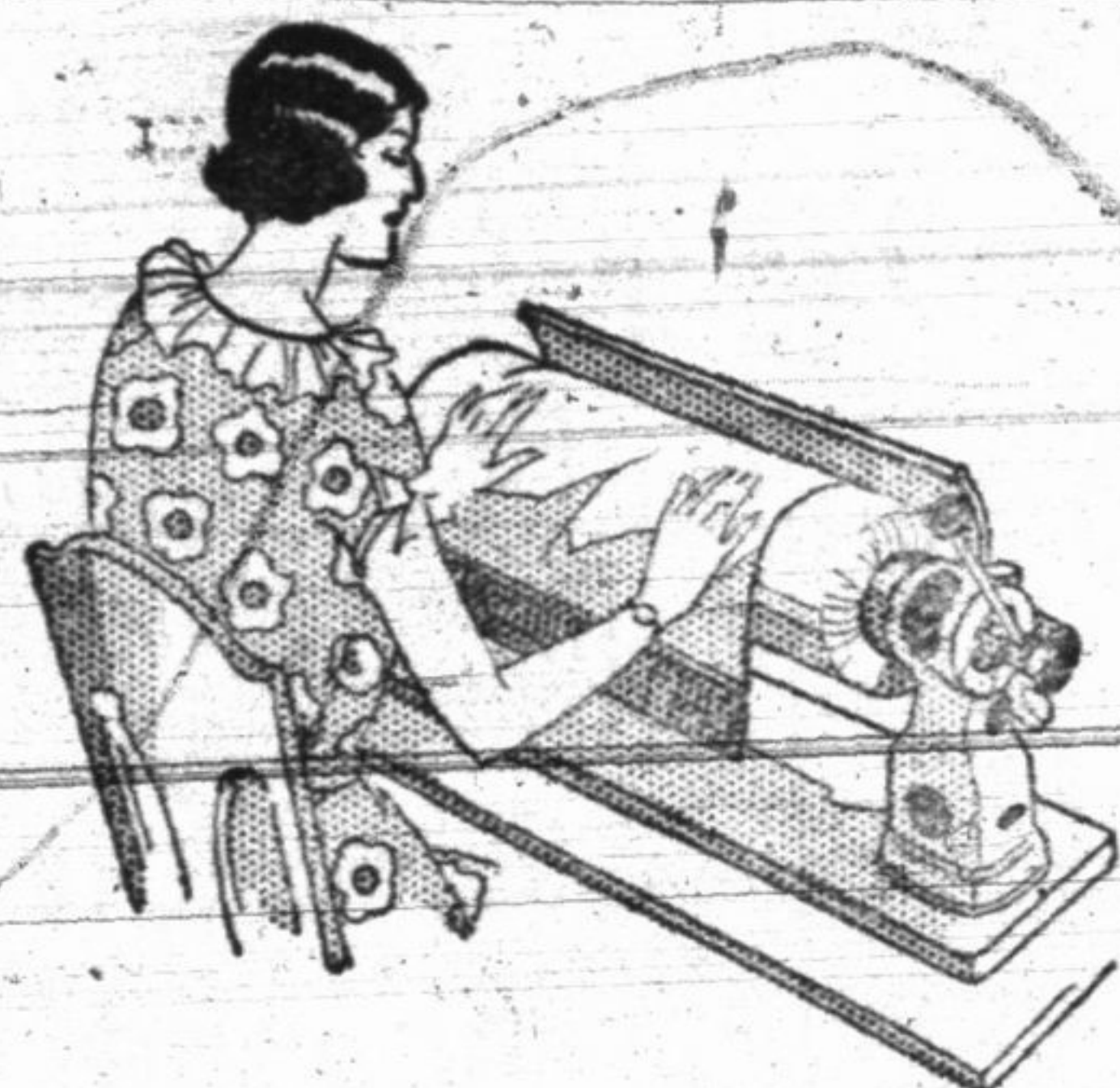

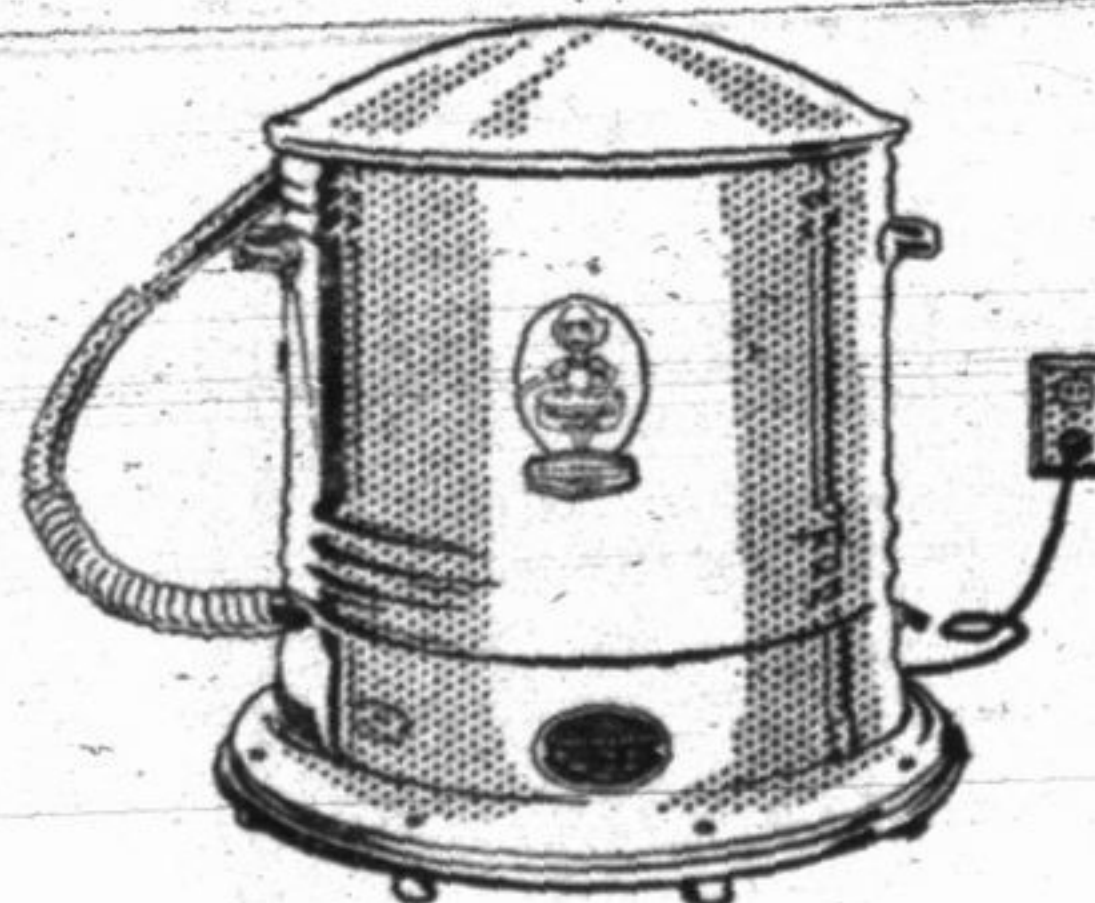
