### Dumaresq Spencer Post Addresses Resolution to Mayor, Commissioners

The following resolution, passed by Dumaresq Spencer post, American Legion, and addressed to the Mayor and Commissioners of the city of Highland Park, is printed herewith without any editorial comment:

August 27, 1931.

To the Honorable Mayor and Commissioners:

We, the Dumaresq Spencer Post, No. 145, American Legion, of Highland Park, Ill., duly submit to your August body a copy of the resolution that was passed by our post August 27, 1931:

Whereas, it has been called to the attention of the American Legion that there is a position of city nurse to be appointed by the mayor and commissioners of the city of Highland Park.

Whereas, we further understand this position is now being occupied by a married woman, whose husband is not incapacitated in any way and also is a non-resident of Highland Park.

Be it resolved: Dumaresq Spencer post, No. 145, American Legion, do heartily endorse Miss Catherine Sullivan for the position of city nurse now pending appointment by the new city administration.

Miss Sullivan is duly qualified in every respect, being born, raised and educated in the city of Highland Park and is still residing at 317 Park avenue. She is unmarried, and further has served her country in time of need by serving in a Red Cross unit with a two year honorable overseas "War record" and is the only woman member of our post.

Professionally Miss Sullivan is a graduate and registered nurse, being a graduate of the Nursing department of Northwestern university, with several years of varied experience including hospital, social and Red Cross work.

Be it further resolved: That four copies be made of this resolution and be distributed in the following manner: one to the mayor and commissioners; one each to the Highland Park Press and Highland Park News; and one to be filed in the books of the Dumaresq Spencer Post, No. 145, American Legion, Highland Park, Ill., as permanent record.

### Highland Park School Children on Honor Roll

No matter in what direction the Highland Park parents curtails his expenditures during a period of "suspended prosperity" he does not interfere with his child's school bank account. Banking goes on just the same, and accounts of the youngsters are kept active by steady weekly deposits every bank day.

The Thrift Almanack, official publication of Thrift, Inc., of Chicago, school savings bank headquarters, is responsible for this bit of information. In the Almanack's honor roll for cities whose pupils maintain a record of approximately two-thirds and more of the total school population making regular deposits in the school bank, the name of Highland Park appears prominently displayed.

The Thrift Almanack is a bi-monthly journal containing stories, plays, and lesson-helps for teachers to use in promoting thrift education. It is non-purchasable and is distributed to local teachers through courtesy of the Highland Park State bank, which co-operates with the board of education in making this project available to the local school.

### SEVERAL HURT HERE IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

**Holiday Week-end Takes Toll of Fifteen Lives in Chicago Vicinity**

Sheldon White, 17, of the Moraine hotel was severely cut and bruised in an automobile accident near Appleton, Wis., Tuesday of last week, in which four persons were killed and three others, including White, badly hurt.

Seaborn Whatley, 17, of Chicago who was driving a car in which White and William Marsh, 17, one of the victims, were riding, is held by Appleton authorities. He may be charged with manslaughter.

Marsh; Mrs. Albert Matthew, 60, Appleton; Mrs. Louis Zern of Marshfield, Wis., and her daughter, Alice, 9, died as results of the accident.

Whatley was driving Marsh and White to his parents' summer home, and failed to stop at an arterial highway intersection, authorities said.

#### Taken to Hospital

John Kaiser of Green Bay, Wis. is seriously injured in Highland Park hospital following a collision Sunday at the south limits of Deerfield. His brother, Lawrence, was dismissed from the hospital the same day with a fractured arm. John Kaiser is under the care of Dr. Davis of Deerfield, with a fractured arm.

Three Chicagoans, whose automobile collided with the Kaiser car, are sought by Deerfield and Chicago police. Although their automobile was wrecked, the Chicago trio were only slightly injured. They told Dr. Davis and Chief Percy McLaughlin of Deerfield they would go to the Highland Park hospital for treatment. When they failed to appear, McLaughlin began a search for them. He will track them through the automobile's vehicle license.

#### Waukegan Resident Killed

R. H. Hitchcock, 60, of 1205 Ash street, Waukegan, was fatally injured Friday night as he was struck by an automobile while crossing the street at Glen Flora avenue and Ash street with his daughter, Ellen.

Paul Anderson, 21, of Zion, driver of the automobile, rushed the dying man to Victory Memorial hospital. He died before medical aid reached him. Sergt. Bart Tyrrell arrested young Anderson for assault with a deadly weapon when witnesses testified they had seen his automobile traveling at a high rate of speed.

The motor crash death toll over the holiday week-end reached fifteen in the Chicago region. The most spectacular smash occurred near Tech Monday evening, in which eleven persons were injured and three cars damaged.
