**St. James Wins 19th
Victory of the Season
from Evanston Tigers**

St. James won a closely contested game from the Evanston Tigers, a fast-stepping colored team, at Highwood field last Sunday. The final score was 2-1.

"Burt" Berube got the range on Walker, the star colored pitcher, in the fourth inning and lifted the ball over the center field fence for a home-run to give home team the lead. Evanston tied the score in the seventh on a walk, a stolen base, an in-field out and sacrificed fly.

St. James won the ball game in the seventh when Thurston drove Berube home from second with a double against the left field wall. Yeary for St. James and Walker for the Tigers staged a great pitching battle. Yeary struck out nine men and allowed five hits while Walker struck out four and allowed five hits.

The victory was the fifteenth out of the last 16 games for St. James and their nineteenth of the season.

**DO-X May Be Brought
to Great Lakes Station**

Great Lakes Naval Training station authorities last week welcomed Captain Wolfgang von Gronau, German pilot who has twice crossed the frozen arctic by air. His ship, a twin-motored Dornier-Wal seaplane, was overhauled at the naval station, and returned to Chicago Saturday.

Meanwhile, the possibility that the DO-X, the largest heavier-than-air craft in the world, and which recently completed a trip from Germany to New York via the South Atlantic and Brazil, will visit Great Lakes loomed when it became known that the huge ship will visit Chicago.

John R. Fulton, president of the Waukegan-North Chicago Chamber of Commerce telegraphed Captain Fritz W. Hammer, commander of the ship, asking him to visit the naval station and Waukegan. Harbor facilities at the naval station and Waukegan are ideal, Fulton said in his telegram.

Lt. Clarence Schildhaur, naval officer who acted as co-pilot of the DO-X on its trans-Atlantic crossing, is a former Great Lakes man, having been trained at that station.

The DO-X is now in New York, where it is undergoing repairs after its long sea voyage.
