**Confesses Burglary  
Martin Hobbs' Home  
to Chicago Police**

Possible solution of the burglary in the Martin Hobbs home, 520 Manor drive, Highland Park, came last week through the confession to Chicago police by Otto Schoenberg, 35, 6440 Ellis avenue, Chicago, to being the "telephone bandit" who has been hunted for six months.

The Hobbs home was looted several weeks ago, Schoenberg, admitted to Sergt. William Lawler, of the detective bureau, after the same fashion that was followed in all of his alleged crimes.

Police said that Schoenberg had been so active that he was unable to recall the number of burglaries to his credit, and they were inclined to believe that more north shore burglaries could be traced to him in time.

A sweater brought the downfall of the man. Lawler had been given a fairly good description of the man, especially his sweater. When he noticed Schoenberg's garment he decided that he had located the right suspect.

His plan of operation, he told police, was to pose as a repairman for the telephone company and then ransack the house after he had tinkered with the wires long enough to give him the opportunity to make the entry into the home.
