### August Weather Here Was About Normal, It Is Reported; Rainfall

With the exception of an unusually heavy rainfall, the weather last month was little different than that of the same month a year ago, according to the monthly statement made by John O. Laux, official government weather recorder for Lake county.

The maximum temperature last month, the report shows, was 99 degrees on the 8th. In August of last year the maximum of 98 degrees was reached on the 3rd.

The minimum temperature last month was 46 degrees on the 31st as compared to 46 degrees on the 2nd in August of last year.

The mean temperature for last month was 71 degrees. On August of last year it was 71.7 degrees.

Last month there were 14 clear days, 3 cloudy and 14 partly cloudy days. On August last year there were 16 clear days, 3 cloudy days and 12 partly cloudy days.

The prevailing winds last month were from the southwest. They were from the northwest in August, last year.

The rainfall last month amounted to 3.76 inches as compared to one inch in August of last year.

### Find Man's Body in Shark in Hawaii Ids.

The body of Sadao Nakatus, Honolulu merchant was found inside the body of a huge shark by fishermen who cut open their catch, says a report from Honolulu, H. I.

Convinced that Minoru Kanagwa, fellow merchant, had met the same fate, the shark fishers lay in wait off Barber's point for more deep sea killers. The merchants had been missing since setting out in a skiff Sunday on a fishing expedition.

Navy airplanes, including one in which Lieut. W. L. Rees and another flier risked their lives when forced down in the shark-infested waters, gave up the search. Navy officers said they were convinced both merchants had been eaten by sharks.

The shark that devoured Nakatus was 18 feet long and weighed 750 pounds. It was one of two caught and cut open by fishermen today.

Identification of Nakatus' body was made through dental work.

Another plane stood by when Lieut. Rees' craft was forced to the waves 60 miles from Honolulu. A destroyer later removed the fliers and took their plane in tow.

### Dean Babcock Resigns from State University

Kendric C. Babcock, dean of the college of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Illinois since 1913, who announced his resignation last April, formally retired yesterday.

A successor has not been named, but Harris F. Fletcher, assistant Dean, will act during the coming year.

Prof. T. Eliot Benner, formerly with Columbia university, assumed the duties of dean of the college of education today, succeeding the late Dean Charles E. Chadsey, who died last November.

### BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

#### Happenings About This Part of North Shore; Doings at County Seat

Mrs. Anne Margaret Jorgenson, resident of Waukegan for the past 40 years, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Carl J. Jensen last week, in that city.

Caught in the act of stealing a wheel from a parked truck in the rear of 723 Pine street, Waukegan, 9 o'clock one night last week, Fred Brunker, 34, of 1420 West Parkway avenue, Chicago, was arrested by the police, who were of the opinion that the man is demented.

Forced to abandon operations in the city by persistent raiding by police, bookmakers have closed up shop in Waukegan and moved out into the county, it is reported.

Friday and Saturday, September 25 and 26, have been set aside as the dates of Waukegan's Grand Fall Opening by members of the mercantile division of the Waukegan-North Chicago chamber of commerce. All stores in Waukegan will be asked to participate.

Harry F. Powers, the mad Black beard butcherer of Quiet Dell, Va., and once a salesman of made-to-measure clothing, conducted a house-to-house canvass in the city of Waukegan about ten years ago and several men's suits there, it is reported.

Demand that the North Shore Sanitary district board erect two disposal plants in the city one at the foot of South avenue and the other on the North Flats to provide for sewage disposal, has been made to the Waukegan city council.

Both Waukegan and North Chicago are alarmed over the fate of the two street departments through the slashing of the Waukegan township road and bridge tax rate by the town board.

Workmen on Route 173, new Zanesville to Rockford highway, unearthed a number of Indian skeletons recently claimed by an unknown authority to be over 500 years old. The bones were turned up in the course of digging out the highway on Champlin Lake hill on the southwest side of the lake.

Irene Williams, 18, summer resident of Cedar Lake, was instantly killed last week, when a light roadster, driven by Harry Smith, 17-year-old son of a Chicago insurance man now living at Cedar Lake, overturned on Route 21 just north of Lake Villa. The girl's head was crushed when the car rolled over pinning her underneath.
