Residents of Ravinia, Highland Park and Lake Bluff, who have generously contributed flowers, fruits and vegetables to the Chicago Plant, Flower and Fruit guild on Fridays, for distribution to hospitals, settlements, and visiting nurses stations, will be interested in the following letter from Miss Lea D. Taylor of Chicago Commons, Grand avenue and Morgan street, one of the institutions served on Friday. Miss Taylor says: "We are truly grateful to the Plant, Flower and Fruit guild for the flowers, fruits, and vegetables which have been sent this year. They are most welcome. It is the only opportunity we have of giving our Italian and Polish neighbors the things which they so greatly love.

"We distribute them through our day nursery, through a clinic of pre-natal mothers, through families in the neighborhood where there are distress and want, and through our little children, who crave the flowers very much. We can use almost any amount.

"We are especially grateful for food, as there are many families that cannot possibly get fresh vegetables. The county supplies consist of groceries and canned foods. One of our poor neighbors who is practically dependent upon county supplies said, 'Yes, they send groceries, but no food'. Our Italians are not in ordinary years used to canned food."

The guild season will end about October 1. Garden owners are asked to be especially generous this last month. Please remember that fruits, fresh or preserved, and vegetables are sorely needed by the unfortunates to whom the guild ministers.

Zion Woman Brings Suit Against Sons, Daughters

Attorney James G. Welch filed a praecipe in a \$50,000 suit in Circuit court last week in which Mrs. Anna Husted, Zion, charged that her sons and daughters had alienated the affections of her late husband, Harry B. Husted, owner of the Bereda Paint company in Zion.

The bill named as defendants Lew Sarett, Ravinia, poet, professor and Boy Scout leader, and his wife; Bryan Husted and wife, Waukegan; Granger Husted, Brookfield, and Mr. and Mrs. George Rumsfeld, Evanston.

Mrs. Sarett and Mrs. Rumsfeld are daughters of the plaintiff.

The bill will charge, according to Attorney Welch, that the children visited their father several times, presumably to influence him, and 288 shares of stock in the paint company were turned over to Granger Husted. The entire stock totaled 300 shares.

Mrs. Husted claims that she invested \$12,000 of her own money in the paint works. The estate is said to be \$50,000.
