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will be a two-story, basement and attic, fireproof structure, so arranged as to divide the children into family groups, two complete units being provided in the building. Entrance is over a terrace 21 by 30 feet, into a large entry hall, which leads right and left into the two sections of the home. There is a large living room with a natural fireplace on each side in front, and back of that a sewing room and quiet room. The entry hall leads back to a large stair hall, the dining room opening off this. There is a common kitchen for both sections. Provision is made on the first floor for storage rooms for toys and clothing. There is a large refrigerator pantry and a cook's pantry off the kitchen, with ample cabinet space provided. Washroom and toilet facilities also are on this floor. The second floor contains the dormitories, a mother's room and a helper's room, supply room and closet space.

The dormitories are unique in that semiprivacy is provided for the children, space being partitioned off into cubicles.

Many Visit Replica of Old Ft. Dearborn, World's Fair Feature

Although Chicago's 1933 World's Fair will not open for another 22 months, already 100,000 visitors have flocked to Old Fort Dearborn, its first exhibit building, since it was opened May 15.

From Timbuctoo, Siam, Malay, Japan and a score of strange lands between, a constantly growing stream of pilgrims has been pouring into this replica of what was Chicago's first permanent building.

The original, here faithfully reproduced from hand-hewn log palisades to fifteen-star flag, was built in 1803 and destroyed following the massacre of the evacuating garrison in 1812.

While only a few hundred people ever saw the original Fort Dearborn, more than 1,000 visitors are viewing the replica each day. The visitors come from at least 45 states in the Union, the District of Columbia, four United States' territorial possessions and thirty foreign lands, according to their signatures in the fort's register.

The Philippines, Hawaii, the Canal Zone and Alaska appear among the addressees given. Other addresses are Russia, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Cuba, Canada, Germany, Scotland, France, New Zealand, Belgium, Denmark, Holland, Siam, Ukrania, Italy, Mexico, South Africa, Sweden, England, China, Brazil, Norway, Syria, Greece, Hungary, India, Malay, Ireland and Egypt.

To care for this constantly growing throng, hours during which the Fort is open have been extended from 9:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily and Sunday.

curiosity and favorable comment its new style.

Rudolf Bockelmann, one of leading baritones, is singing at reuth. He is a most popular and I had a long visit with him. Pollak has been of great assistance during my stay in Germany, and host of friends have been most entertaining.

We are now in Salzburg, where we are hearing Italian as well as German artists. The program Monday was "Don Giovanni," "Don Pasquale" last night. Tomorrow we will hear "The Marriage of Figaro," directed by Dr. Kraus, a young conductor who has been quite the rage.

Bruno Walter conducted the "Giovanni" Monday evening. The tempi were very fast. This performance offered opportunity for thought regarding the psychological effect of language in opera. "Don Giovanni" was written to an Italian text, not only was the music composed in Mozart to Italian words, but we remember that here in the States there is a distinct Italian influence in music as well as in architecture. So the speed of the music of "Giovanni" is incompatible with German language and, therefore, the opera lost much of its charm.

I like the Festspielhaus here, which I had never seen, as it is only a few years old. It has quite a charm in its simplicity.

Yesterday we motored to Ischl to hear some singers, and while there met Eric Korngold, the composer of "Die Todte Stadt." He played for his new "Baby Suite," a charming composition, modern but full of lightful melodies. Like all really talented people, he is simple and unassuming, a perfect host.

This trip has given me a new picture of post-war operative conditions in Europe. I hope we may soon have our own training school for young artists so that we may create our own stars and educate them according to our standards which are in many ways very different from what are accepted over here.
