Religious Leadership School Is To Be Held Beginning October 12

On Monday evening, Oct. 12, in the Highland Park Presbyterian church at 7:30 another leadership training school will begin for Sunday school teachers and for parents who wish to give their children some religious instruction in the home. This school, which has been planned by the Deerfield-Shields Council of Religious Education, will include persons from Glencoe, Deerfield, Northbrook, Highland Park, Highwood, Lake Forest, and Lake Bluff. It will meet on six successive Monday evenings from 7:30-9:30, closing on the evening of November 16.

Change in Time

In previous years the training school has been put on during the weeks immediately following the new year. It seemed the desire of the group last spring to try the early fall this year. In former schools the registration has been as high as one hundred with as many as sixty receiving credit for completing the full work of the course.

Two years ago the courses dealt mainly with the study of the pupil in the primary, junior, and intermediate age groups. Last year the courses dealt primarily with lesson material for these same age groups. This year we offer an attractive list of special courses. One will be a study of the New Testament. This will help one to understand and to use the New Testament to a much greater advantage. It is an excellent course for teachers and parents.

Special Course

A course which will appeal especially to young people is one in sacred drama and pageantry. There will be the actual production of a pageant during the school. Another interesting course is in missionary education in the church school. This will be very helpful to the superintendent and the pastor, also to members of the women's missionary societies. The last course is in story telling. In all work with children the story is an important teaching method. Yet it is not easy to use the story effectively. Here is a practical course for all those who use the story in their teaching.

Next week there will be an article concerning the personnel of this school including the leaders, officers, and the members of the teaching staff. Watch for it.

McNeil, Antioch fullback starred for Antioch. Deerfield made eight first downs in the first half and five in the second for a total of thirteen first downs. Antioch could not break thru Deerfield's forward wall until the third quarter, when they made two first downs. Coach Peel gave every player on the squad a chance to play in the game.

FORMER PRESIDENT OF WOMAN'S CLUB DIES

Services for Mrs. Elizabeth Raffin Baker Who Died in Biloxi Held Thursday

Mrs. Elizabeth Raffin Baker, who died Saturday, Sept. 12, at Biloxi, Miss., lived and for many years was well known in Highland Park. She was born on June 15, 1864, in San Francisco, Calif., where her father, John T. Raffin, had gone from Chicago during the gold rush of the late fifties. Her mother, Elizabeth MacDonald, who came to California from Melbourne, Australia, was of Scotch-Irish descent. Her father was born in Coupar, Fifeshire, Scotland.

When Elizabeth Raffin was a very young child, the family moved to Chicago. Her father was of the firm of Clark, Raffin & Co., founders, who were the first to put their plant in operation after the Chicago fire, furnishing the iron construction material for many of the familiar Chicago buildings, before the steel age. She received her education at West Division high school, Chicago. On the death of her mother and the marriage of her elder sister, Eleanor, to William Manson, she was left to preside over a family of five younger brothers and sisters. In 1885 Mr. Raffin purchased a home on East Central avenue, Highland Park, on the site of the present Witten block.

On October 10, 1893, Elizabeth Raffin married Charles Harvey Baker, son of Dr. Milton H. Baker, one of the first graduate physicians in this part of the state, who had moved to Highland Park in 1868. Mr. Baker was the founder of Raffin & Baker, was the founder of Raffin & Baker, and Mrs. Baker built their home at 426 Glencoe avenue, in 1894. In 1895 John M. Baker, their only child, was born there.

Spooner Bandit Held To The Grand Jury

James De Witt, 45, who conducts a rabbit farm west of Glencoe must stand trial in Lake county circuit court on charges of impersonating an officer and extorting money from roadside "spooners."

He was bound over to the October grand jury Saturday by Magistrate Herman Schwery at Highland Park and released on \$2,000 bonds. William Keiser, an employe on DeWitt's farm who was held on similar charges, was released from custody.

After the men were released Saturday, Cook county authorities re-arrested the pair and took them to Cook county where they are wanted on similar charges.

The pair were arrested recently by Highland Park police in the act of robbing a pair of roadside "spooners" near Highland Park. De Witt was wearing a Cook county deputy sheriff's badge at the time of his arrest. The men are alleged to have been operating a "shake-down" racket in Lake and Cook counties using spooners as their victims.
