

L. F. ACADEMY BEGINS SEVENTY-FOURTH YEAR

Opens Tuesday with Largest Enrollment in Its History; Grid Schedule

Convocation exercises held in Reid Hall chapel Tuesday afternoon marked the opening of the seventy-fourth school year at Lake Forest academy. The enrollment is the largest in the school's history, a considerable number of applicants having been refused admission because of insufficient dormitory facilities.

Reid Hall, the main school building which was damaged by fire last May, has, at a cost of over \$30,000.00, been completely remodeled and made fireproof during the past summer under the direction of Cyrus McCormick, Jr., chairman of the school's building committee. In addition to this, the trustees have continued their policy of modernizing the classrooms by the substitution of directors' tables and easy chairs for the old-fashioned school desks used by four generations of Lake Foresters. Also, these rooms have been redecorated in pastel shades and attractive curtains have been hung at the windows.

Begins 19th Year

John Wayne Richards, deviser of the Richards plan of combined and extended class-study periods, staggering and rotating schedules, and self-responsible periods, now a part of the curriculum at the academy, begins his nineteenth year as headmaster. During its first full school year of operation the Richards plan reduced failures in all subjects forty-seven per cent, lengthened the scholastic honor roll twenty-one per cent, and stimulated scholastic interest, independent thinking, and the will to study, among the students.

M. J. Hughitt, a graduate of Cornell college and a graduate student at Yale university, will teach history. Mr. Hughitt formerly taught at Northwestern university.

The initiation recognition and installation services used by the various groups in the Girl Reserve movement offer a special opportunity to interpret this symbolism.

The Girl Reserves code serves further to express the meaning of the

Blue Triangle. Gracious in manner, impartial in judgment, ready for service, loyal to friends, reaching toward the best, earnest in purpose, seeing the beautiful, eager for knowledge, reverent to God, victorious over self, ever dependable, sincere at all times.

What the world needs today is girls and women who are not mere drifters and players, but those who can be relied upon to finish a piece of work, by doing so they add much more to their own worth.

To face squarely the daily tests which came at home, in school, at play, to be a friend to all and strive to show love in every little deed, to give the best of self in service to God and in fellowship with girls everywhere, are golden threads woven through the fabric out of which a Girl Reserve fashions her thoughts and actions.

The right way for everyday living means to a Girl Reserve: simply graciousness; constant and consistent impartiality; readiness for service; however humble and insignificant; unwaiving, unqualified loyalty to friends; an eager desire for knowledge to the beautiful and the worthwhile in life and in living; sincerity and earnestness of purpose which leads ever upward and outward; a sense of responsibility which not only begins a task but also finishes it: a control of self which makes for a body and mind clean and pure in all ways; and a reverence for God which shows itself in work and in worship.
