NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a public hearing will be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Highland Park, Illinois, on Thursday, the 22nd day of October, 1931, at eight o'clock p.m., which said public hearing will be conducted by the undersigned, the Zoning Committee for the City of Highland Park, designated and appointed by the Council of the City of Highland Park for that purpose to consider amending an ordinance entitled:

"AN ORDINANCE amending an Ordinance Entitled 'An Ordinance to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings; to regulate and limit the intensity of the use of lot areas, and to regulate and determine the areas of open spaces within and surrounding such buildings; to classify, regulate, and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified industrial, business, residential, and other uses; to divide the entire City of Highland Park into districts for the purpose of this ordinance; to fix standards to which buildings or structures shall conform; to prohibit uses, buildings, or structures incompatible with the character of such districts respectively; and to prevent additions to and alterations or remodeling of existing buildings or structures in such a way as to avoid the restrictions and limitations lawfully imposed hereunder and to provide penalties for violation hereof,' as amended" in the following manner:

It is proposed that the block bounded by Deerfield Avenue, Walnut Street and Oakwood Avenue, City of Highland Park, which is now zoned as Class "B" Residential be rezoned as Class "C" Business Property; that the property at the northwesterly corner of Sheridan Road and Park Avenue, City of Highland Park, which is now zoned as Class "B" Residential be rezoned as Class "C" Business Property.

It is also proposed that Definitions and Regulations covering apartment house zones will be considered.

At said public hearing an opportunity will be afforded to all persons interested in the changes above mentioned to be heard in relation to said proposed amendment.

THE SCOUT MOVEMENT GUIDING OUR YOUTH

At a moment in the world's history when the traditional ties of ecclesiastical and parental authority prove no longer adequate to control the impulses of youth; at a moment when youth is ruthlessly examining all accepted doctrines with a passion for reality and a hatred of sham which no preceding generation within the memory of living men has known; at this moment the Scout movement has come, reasserting fundamental verities, but reasserting them in terms measure by its own experience and which youth can understand, can prove to be according to the plain facts of its daily life.

To ears on which (because of the over-seriousness and buncombe of generations of theologians, remote from realities) the word "goodness" falls without appeal and the word "sin" drops without generating undue terror, the Scout movement has come with the words "be clean," "be true," "be square." These words represent values which any boy or girl can measure, and indicate a standard against which the thoughts and acts of every day can be set for the judgment of reason and conscience.

Youth is safe, the country is safe, as long as there is an adequate percentage of boys and girls who accept the Scout oath and law and strive to live by it and accept the responsibilities toward their own minds and bodies and toward their fellow-creatures which that oath and law impose.

To parents who are troubled because the authority of the church and the home seems to have grown tenuous and ineffective, the Highland Park Scout movement comes like a messenger from on high, to guide the eager hearts of youth back to the ancient and unchanging verities.
