standing liberal and candidate for the presidency of the United States on the Progressive ticket in the year 1924. Possessing many of the characteristics of his later father, he has already made his presence felt in the Senate by his fight against unemployment and by his advocacy of measures tending to benefit the public. He stands alongside of Mr. Borah as an outstanding political leader in the nation. An excellent and forceful speaker, he will present the subject: "What Progressives are Fighting For."

Senator LaFollette will speak on the above subject at the first of a series of lectures being sponsored by the North Shore Congregation Israel Sisterhood, on October 13, at 8:00 o'clock. The lecture will take place at the Temple auditorium, Lincoln and Vernon avenues, Glencoe.

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
