

W. W. BARTLETT DIES; FUNERAL HELD TODAY

Justice of Peace and Well Known
Resident Victim of Heart
Trouble; Details

Walter Wilde Bartlett, 56, justice of the peace, and life-long resident of the north shore, died Tuesday morning at his home, 369 Bloom st., Highland Park, after an illness of only a few hours. He was a brother of Mayor Charles H. Bartlett of Evanston.

Mr. Bartlett was a state patrol agent and for four years had been a justice of the peace in Deerfield township. He was born in Evanston and was well known on the north shore and in Highland Park, where he was engaged in the insurance business.

Funeral Today

The family physician, Dr. J. H. Lundstrom, was summoned late Monday when Mr. Bartlett, returning from a business trip to Chicago, complained of feeling ill. His condition grew steadily worse, resulting in his death from heart disease Tuesday morning.

Funeral services will be held today at 1:30 p.m. at the First Methodist church, Highland Park, with burial in Rosehill cemetery. Highland Lodge of Modern Woodmen, of which Mr. Bartlett was a member, will furnish pallbearers.

Mr. Bartlett is survived by the widow, Mrs. Helen Bartlett, and by

his eight children, Charles, Donald, Muriel, Carter, Raymond, Shirley and Marcella, at home, and Mrs. William O. Eubanks (Eleanor Bartlett) of Highwood.

He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Edward Walters of Evanston and Mrs. Carmen Wilcoxon of California, and two brothers, Mayor Charles Bartlett of Evanston, and George Bartlett of Memphis, Tenn.

HIGH SCHOOL FIELD HOUSE VOTE OCT. 10

Board of Education Plans to
Use Idle Funds to Give
Unemployed Work

An election to permit the high school board of education to erect a field house on our athletic field will be held Saturday, Oct. 10, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., at the following polling places: East building of the high school, Highland Park; Oak Terrace school, Highwood Village House, Ravinia; City Hall, Lake Forest; and Town Hall, Deerfield. The building is to be erected out of surplus funds in the treasurer's hands, with no bond issue and no tax increase. The election is required by school law which makes it mandatory upon boards of education to secure a favorable majority vote in order to build a school house of any kind. It is said that other high schools have built field houses under similar circumstances with no election; but the Deerfield-Shields board will comply with the law as interpreted by its attorney.

Building Is Needed

Our thirty acre athletic field is most useful in building virility, character, and health among the thirteen hundred students. At this season of the year every afternoon over a hundred students are playing football, about fifty are playing soccer, the ten tennis courts are full, and football contests are being held there (Continued on page 27)
