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among elementary schools of our dis-trict. In the spring many engage in track, tennis, and baseball on the field.

It is evident that these players all need a warm place in which to dress, take showers, or rest between halves. To take a long trip to the high school in clothes wet with perspiration is to invite pneumonia. In fact, our field is not fully available for use without a field house; for most other schools refuse to participate in our track athletics; and the splendid rink for ice skating is for the same reason un-used by our own students in winter.

### Funds on Hand

Fortunately, we now have surplus funds to build and at a time when costs are 20 per cent below normal and when the work will benefit un-employed men in Highland Park, Lake Forest, Highwood and Deer-field. Local workmen and contractors from these towns will be given the preference. Plans have already been drawn and estimates of cost secured.

Bids and work wait only a favorable vote of the citizens. The improvement will cost around \$65,000.00 Idle funds should be used at once to put idle men at work.

The building will be largely of ce-ment and brick, a hundred yards long and fifty feet wide. In addition to the warmed locker rooms and showers mentioned above, there will be a dirt floor and space for indoor track prac-tice. There will be a section for women and girls. The roof of the field house will slant up and give seating capacity for nearly five thou-sand spectators at our games and with no danger of a collapse such as occurred to our temporary bleachers last autumn. We ask the citizens to approve these plans by their favor-able votes one week from next Satur-day.
