

GOOD PROGRESS IN Y.W.C.A. CAMPAIGN

Report \$5,720 Subscribed at Luncheon Friday; Final Meet Oct. 13

Five thousand two hundred and seventy dollars was the total announced at the fourth luncheon of the Y.W.C.A. campaign last Friday. This was at the completion of the first week's work in a campaign for \$12,600 to cover the work of the local Y.W.C.A. for the period beginning October 1, 1931 and ending September 30, 1932.

Although the amount secured was less than half the desired goal, the campaign committee and the team workers present were not discouraged because there are hundreds of people yet to be called upon. A comparison of the list of prospective givers to the Y. W. C. A. with the list of gifts received showed that many friends of the Y.W.C.A. who have been contributors to the budget for several years were not at home or out of town when called upon and these names will be followed up immediately.

It is hoped that all the workers will continue their splendid work and that by Tuesday the "Y" will go over the top. Deerfield-Shields Evening School to Open Monday, Oct. 12

Everything is now in readiness for the opening of evening school next Monday evening, Oct. 12, at 7:30 o'clock. The first part of the evening will be devoted to registration, while the latter part will be given up to organizing of classes. Following is the list of subjects offered, together with the teachers in charge of the work:

Auto Mechanics and electrical systems, Mr. Bolle.

Bookkeeping, Mr. Zipoy.

Carpentry and general woodwork, Mr. Durbahn.

Child study, Mr. Baliard and Mr. Richardson.

Drawing and Blue Print reading, Mr. Pertz.

Dressmaking and art needlework, Mrs. McNutt.

English, Miss Beekmire.

French, Mr. Glace.

Gymnasium and swimming for men, Mr. Peel.

Gymnasium and swimming for women, Miss Read.

Home hygiene and care of the sick, Miss Lasswell.

Mathematics of all kinds, Mr. Davitt.

Public speaking, Mrs. Gaidzik.

Stenography, Miss Knox and Miss Johnson.

Spanish, Miss Rodenbeck.

Science, Mr. McNutt, Mr. Einbecker, and two others.

Typewriting, Mr. Barnes, Miss Johnson.

Classes in any of the above subjects will be organized only if 15 or more students register for such work, and will be discontinued as soon as the enrollment drops below that number.

A word or two might be said regarding the new subjects offered.

The classes in child study, elementary and advanced, will be under the leadership of Mr. Ballard and Mr. Richardson respectively, and will meet on alternate evenings—the beginning group on Monday evening and the advanced group on Wednesday.

Every parent who is interested in the welfare of the child in school can profit by becoming a member of one or the other of these groups. The work will be intensely practical, and many puzzling problems which now confront the father or mother of the adolescent child may find solution in this work.

In response to numerous requests Spanish is being listed for the first time and Miss Rodenbeck of the high school faculty has agreed to conduct this class if a sufficient number register.

Home hygiene and care of the sick is offered in the hope that others beside the small group who requested this work may be sufficiently interested so that such a class will also be formed. Miss Lasswell, who looks after the health of the high school students, has consented to take charge of this work.

The course in science will be in charge of four of the high school science teachers, each taking one quarter of the time for his specialty. Thus there will be five weeks devoted to chemistry and its application to every day life, five to light, heat and electricity, five to sunita-

tion, hygiene, health study, and five to a study of horticulture, gardening, and care of the home grounds. This should prove to be a very interesting and profitable course.

Mr. Glace, the new teacher of French, is a native of France and has taught in this country for about 30 years. He was at one time head of the language department of one of our suburban high schools. All others are either members of the high school faculty or have taught in the evening school before. This assures the students of the best instruction available for whatever work is being offered.

HIGH SCHOOL FIELD HOUSE VOTE OCT. 10

Voters are Urged to Approve
\$65,000 Building Plan;
No Tax Increase

Voters of Highland Park and Lake Forest will be asked on Saturday of this week to approve erection of a fieldhouse at the Deerfield-Shields high school athletic field, to cost about \$65,000.

The building will be erected out of surplus funds in the school treasury and there will be no bond issue and no tax increase, it was emphasized by George J. McBride, president of the board of education. Voters of the district are urged to vote "yes" on this proposition.

The thirty-acre athletic field is located on the west side of Highland Park, some distance from the high school and gymnasium. This season over 100 students are practicing football daily, fifty are out for soccer and many are active in other sports.

Affects Many Students

A large majority of the 1,300 students at Deerfield-Shields participate in some sport, and all of the outdoor facilities are located at the athletic field.

Because of lack of the facilities in a fieldhouse, difficulty has been experienced in booking contests with other schools, especially track events. Use of the skating rink is limited for the same reason.

Plans have already been drawn and construction only awaits a vote of residents. Action would give employment to many residents of Lake Forest, Highland Park and Highwood, and current low building costs could be taken advantage of.
