**Car of Apples from
Bay Lakes Fruit Farm
Owned by John Western**

The autumn surely is here. The report comes that the first car of apples from the Bay-Lakes Fruit farms is on sale at the little way-side store across the Green Bay road from the North Shore cemetery. It is known to many hundreds of North Shore citizens that John Western, the founder of North Shore cemetery, has been developing a fruit farm in the Inland Lakes region of Michigan for several years before he commenced the development of a place of human interment altogether worthy of the North Shore. The fruit-growing business is incorporated under the name "The Bay-Lakes Fruit Farms." For 13 years at least one car of apples has been brought to Illinois from those orchards annually and sold by the road-side. Last year three car loads were sold in six weeks. In addition one thousand gallons of apple cider, three hundred gallons of cherry cider, several hundred cans of cherries, both sweet and sour, a lot of delicious canned red raspberries, and two hundred pounds of honey were sold in the same period. The same toothsome articles of diet with the addition of pure maple syrup are on sale now. In past years these apples have gone into every community from Indiana to Southern Wisconsin. There seems to be something about the juiciness, flavor and texture of apples from the region chosen by Mr. Western for fruit-growing and the benefit of his health in vacation time that is different from the fruit grown anywhere else. The cider is made from the same carefully sprayed and picked fruit. Many North Shore citizens have visited Bay-Lake Fruit farms during vacation season and

they report that it is indeed a charming sight to see one continuous orchard a mile long.

Of course the expense of developing and caring for 10,000 apple trees and 5,000 cherry trees is enormous, and the years of waiting before any returns are received certainly requires a lot of patience. Big tractors with accompanying implements are used to keep the ground cultivated, large spraying outfits are required in putting on thousands of gallons of water daily for 10 days, 5 and 6 times every season; large trucks are needed to haul the supplies from the railroad station and to convey the fruit to the cars in the autumn. 78,000 pounds of cherries were harvested last summer, and now 2 car loads of fall apples have been picked, graded, wiped, and packed. The management reports that there will probably be four cars of winter apples. Notwithstanding the quality and all the expense the company is selling apples for 50 cents per bushel less than ever before.
