

CARNIVAL AT HIGH SCHOOL OCTOBER 31

Faculty and Students to Give Entertainment for Relief Fund; Features

In place of the customary Hallowe'en party the Deerfield-Shields faculty is sponsoring a real honest-to-goodness carnival complete with the booths, concessions, sideshows, confetti, streamers, barkers, and everything which goes to make up a carnival. It is to be held on Hallowe'en, October 31, on all the floors of the gym building. It will begin in the afternoon and continue through the evening. It is to be given for the benefit of the unemployed in Highland Park and the surrounding towns.

The carnival is to be presented as a Hallowe'en affair and all decorations will be appropriate for this day. Also in accordance with the day there will be numerous fortune telling booths.

Foremost among the sideshows of which there will be a great variety is the Chamber of Horrors which is under the direction of Mr. Einbecker. The Marionette club will also have a good performance, while the other side shows will range from musical presentations to funny skits.

There will be a Water Carnival under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Kendig which will bring thrills and laughs to all who witness it.

Le Barons, Deerfield's best known jazz orchestra, will furnish the syn-

copation for those who wish to dance. It will be a "jitney" dance, a nominal charge being made for each dance.

There will be excellent food of all kind and sort, and the game of Beano, which is similar to Bingo or Tango, will also be played.

Every member of the faculty is either taking part or having charge of some part of the carnival. Miss Rinckenberger is chairman of the entire affair. Mr. Nelson is acting as co-chairman and is in charge of the finance end. Miss Chester is in charge of the concessions and Mr. Schneider is in charge of the booths.

The decorating in the boys' gym and the balcony, concessions, and booths, will be in charge of Miss Kerfoot and the Daubers Art club. Miss Wood has charge of the decoration of the girls' gym.

Miss Wood and her art classes are making attractive posters to advertise the carnival.

The P. T. A. is taking charge of the donations, which are being received from the merchants in Highland Park, Highwood, Lake Forest, Deerfield, and Ravinia.

Advertising and publicity for the carnival is being handled by Fritz Kaumanns, Richard Hastings, Robert Jacks, and Wilfred Miessner.

Money in coins and bills will not be accepted at the booths and concessions, but will have to be changed into tickets of denominations of two cents, five cents, seven cents, and ten cents.

Total of 1,312 Are Registered at High School Up to Oct. 1

Registration figures for October 1 show that 1312 students were in attendance at Deerfield-Shields for the 1931-32 school year. This compares with 1264 students at the same date last year. The sophomore class, with 400 leads in the number of students. The juniors come next with 279, and the seniors come in fourth with 229, and the post-grades last with 22.

Although the boys were in the majority last year with 642 as compared with 622 girls, the girls lead this year with 666 as compared to 651 boys.

In the lower classes the boys are more numerous, with 197 boys to 185 girls in the freshmen class, and 211 boys to 189 girls in the sophomore class. In the junior class, however, there are 158 girls to 112 boys, and in the senior class 117 girls as compared with 112 boys. The girls also lead among post graduates with 12 to 10 boys.

HIGH SCHOOL FIELD HOUSE IS ASSURED

Favorable Vote Saturday Upon Proposal to Build; Description of Plans

Favorable vote last Saturday on the proposition to approve building of a \$65,000 field house on the Deerfield-Shields athletic field insures an adequate field house and stadium for the school. The vote totaled 205 in favor of the proposal and 90 against.

The vote in detail was as follows: Highland Park, 118 for and 26 against; Lake Forest, 38 against and 6 for; Ravinia, 25 against and 24 for; Highwood, 20 for and none against; Deerfield, 37 for and one against.

Building of the structure will be begun as soon as possible, and will give employment to many skilled mechanics and laborers in the school district, as the plan is to use local labor throughout.

Stadium and Fieldhouse

The building, which is to be 260 feet long, will be a combined field house and stadium. Locker rooms, both for boys and girls, with shower accommodations, dressing rooms, rubbing rooms, and "visiting team" rooms are to be part of the indoor equipment. A cinder track, three yards wide, with a 60-yard straight-away, high and broad jumping pits, and pole vaulting pits will be included.

With a seating capacity of 3,000 people on top of the field house, there will be plenty of room for spectators. The building will face the east, and will be in the position of the present bleachers.

Concrete is to be the main part of the structure, with wooden seats such as in Dyeche Stadium. A plant to furnish electricity, hot water, and heat will be installed.

Start Work Soon

As soon as the blue prints are completed, and all plans made, the work of construction will begin. Weather permitting, the work will go on through the winter and should be completed next spring.

The need of a field house has been greatly felt because of the fact that the athletic field is so far from the school.
