Smaller Ballot for Election Next Fall Is Prospect; New Type

Greeting voters in elections next fall will be a ballot smaller than those upon which they have marked their choices at Illinois polls in the last dozen years.

That results from the revision of election laws in the last legislature, providing that one column will accommodate the various candidates classified as "Independent."

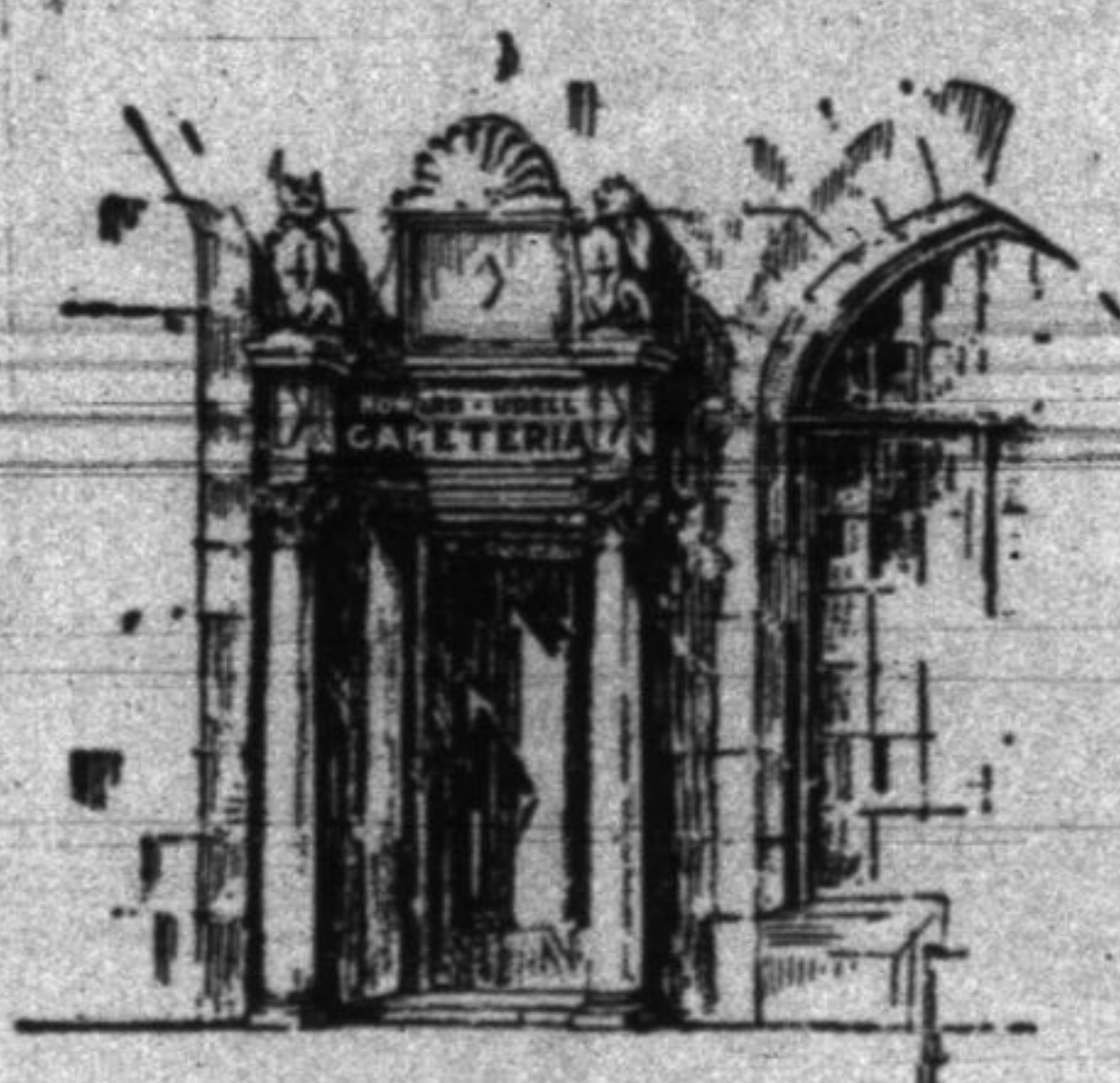
There will be fewer of the minor groups designated as parties on the ballot, for in order to be so listed the group must have the affiliation of five per cent of the voters. In previous elections two per cent has sufficed to establish a party.

The revisions were made by the legislature upon recommendation of the Illinois election commission, composed of Judge E. K. Jarecki and Gen. Milton J. Foreman of Chicago and Judge James S. Baldwin of Decatur.

The change will effect a convenience to voters, for in the larger communities the ballots were unwieldy and confusing. In a recent election the ballots in Cook county were 31 by 40 inches in dimensions.

The ballots included many columns of independent and minor group candidates that contained only a few scattered names.

Summer service only is to be rendered by the Metropolitan Coach company between Chicago, Evanston, Niles Center, Morton Grove, Glenview, Wheeling, Libertyville, Grayslake, Lake Villa, Antioch and the Wisconsin state line, under an order issued by the Illinois Commerce Commission.



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
