Mrs. Hearne, chairman of New Trier council of Girl Scouts was the speaker of the evening. Each patrol of the troop gave a short skit and the evening ended with a camp fire scene and later punch and cookies were served. The cookies were made by the Girl Scouts.

Ravinia Rally Troop 5 was held on Tuesday evening in the auditorium of Ravinia school. Miss Mildred Pitherbridge spoke on "Girl Scouting and what it has meant to me." Miss Pitherbridge was a counselor at Camp Timber Trail near Munising, Mich., this past summer and is acting captain of a troop in Chicago. Some Tenderfoot and second class badges were awarded as well as Merit badges. The girls gave silhouette pictures of the different Girl Scout badges requirements and later served cookies made by themselves and fruit punch.

Troop 3 and 4 held their Rally Thursday evening in the auditorium of Lincoln school. Mrs. Nena Wilson Badenock, author and writer for many of the current magazines on Home Economics, was the speaker of the evening. Her theme was "The Aims and Ideals of Girl Scouting." The balance of the evening was spent in games, signalling and pagentry. The members of the

troop had made cake and cookies which they served to the audience with cider.

#### Girl Scout Convention

When the seventeenth annual convention of the Girl Scouts opens in the Hotel Statler at Buffalo, New York, October 14, nationally prominent women from all parts of the country will be present to discuss the problems and progress of the movement which today occupies a vital part in the life of growing girls.

The principal speaker at the opening session will be Dr. Marion Edwards Park, president of Bryn Mawr college, who will talk on "The Girl as a Teacher."

Mrs. Conrad E. Wittlauffer, of Buffalo, will welcome the convention on behalf of the Buffalo and Erie county Girl Scout council, and Mrs. Frederick Edey, national president of the organization, will respond. Mrs. Arthur O. Choate, of New York, is scheduled to announce plans for the Juliette Low Memorial awards next year. These awards will make it possible for Girl Scouts from the United States and other countries to visit the World Chalet in Switzerland, the gift of Mrs. James J. Storrow, of Boston, Mass., to the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

Mrs. Sidonie Mataner Gruenberg, director of the Child Study Association of America, will be the speaker of the evening. Her subject will be "The Family in a Changing Society—Contributions of Modern Education to Home and Family Life."

The afternoon session on opening day will be devoted to regional meetings, the program including discussion of the following items: election of delegates from each region to serve on the national nominating committee; selection of time and place for the Spring regional conferences next year; formulation of Local Council membership objectives for 1932 and needs of local councils in the 12 Girl Scout regions.

Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady, chairman of the Girl Scout national board of directors, will report on the accomplishments of the organization during this past year and announce objectives for the coming year at the second day's session, and Mrs. Edgar Rickard, treasurer, will present the national budget for 1932. Following Mrs. Rickard, Miss Josephine Schain, national director, will make her report for 1931.

The annual election of officers and national board members will be held the following day. The annual Girl Scout banquet, gala event of the convention, will be held that evening. Mayor Charles E. Roesch of Buffalo will greet the delegates on behalf of the city, and Mrs. H. D. Warren, chief commissioner of the Girl Guide Association of Canada, will deliver a message from the girls of her organization to the Girl Scouts in this country.

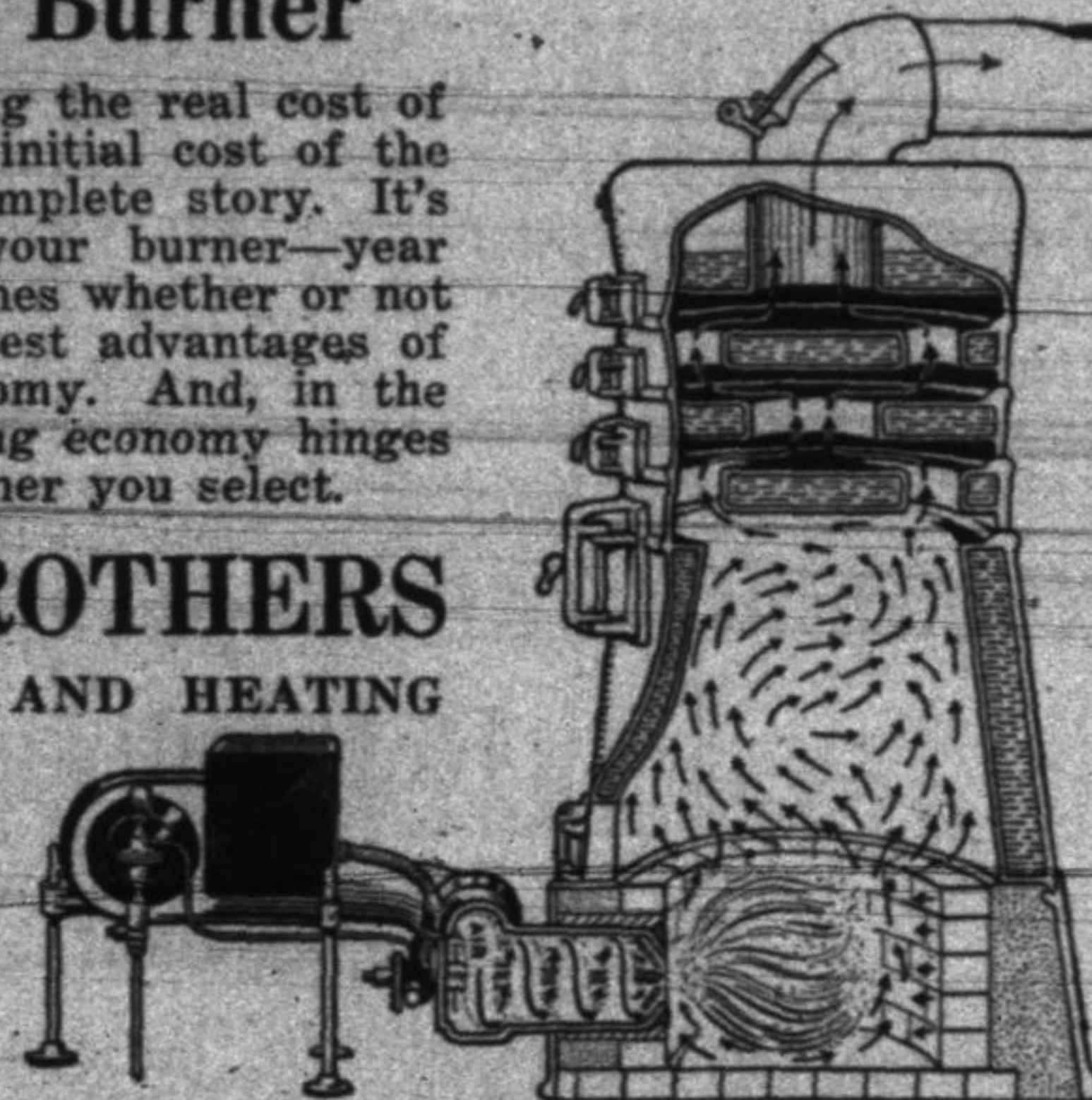
