Suggestions for Floats Some communities have gone to quite a good deal of work in preparing floats, and the following subjects might well be used. However, if floats are not practical or permissible groups may march through the streets to places of assembly and there pose successively. Sub- ing for Luck, Apples and Flour, jects of these scenes or floats are-

1. A float of witches with a large Caldron, brewing spells for the occasion. Black cats crowding about them and yawning would be very effective. (Small boys are admirable for this purpose.)

2. A float of ghosts clanking chains, emitting phosphorescent light, etc.

3. A float of scarecrows, bobbing about like jumping jacks. 4. A float of pumpkins, rolling

and tossing about as in a strong 192 Hospital Beds wind. (Boys are fine for this.)

5. A float of revelers, bobbing for apples-girls and boys, young men and women, ordinary dress, or costumed suitably for the occasion. 6. A float of young people looking into the mirror according to the old tradition.

7. A float of farmers and farmerettes dancing money musk or similar country dances.

8. A float of young people trying to blow out a large candle in the centre, electric bulb white staff to simulate candle.

9. A float of fiddlers, country type, some fiddling and others clapping time. A man doing a jig will be effective.

10. A float of hay, young people arranged as for a hay ride, eating apples and singing.

Other games can be added and various group dances given, such as the Virginia Reel, Captain Jinx, Portland Fancy, and Lancers.
