### Tax Redemption Is Decreased This Fall

Redemption of delinquent taxes has fallen this year to half of what it was a year ago at this time according to information from the office of County Clerk Lew A. Hendee. One day last week, for example, \$700 was paid in to redeem property that had gone to sale in other years for the failure to pay taxes while a year ago for the same day the redemption fees had run close to \$2,000 it was learned.

After taxes go to sale the collection reverts from the treasurer to the county clerk and it is through this office that taxpayers are able to redeem their lands before tax title can be taken.

### Symphony Specials on North Shore Line

The first of the weekly "Symphony Specials," inaugurated by the North Shore line for the convenience of north shore suburban residents in returning from concerts of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, will be operated on Thursday evening, October 15. The special will be operated each Thursday evening for 28 successive weeks up to and including April 21.

Leaving Adams and Wabash station in the Chicago Loop at 10:45 p.m., the special will stop to discharge homeward-bound concert goers at Wilmette, Kenilworth, Indian Hill, Winnetka, Hubbard Woods, Glencoe, Braeside, Ravinia, Highland Park, Highwood, Fort Sheridan, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff and North Chicago Junction. Frequent regular service is afforded by the North Shore line directly to the Loop for those making the trip to Orchestra Hall for the concerts.

### Secure Another Link in Zion-Rockford Rd.; One Piece Is Lacking

Another link of right-of-way in Route 173, the Zion to Rockford road, today was secured by the highway department it was learned from R. M. Lobdel, county highway superintendent.

The portion obtained was from Mrs. Mary Smart, of Antioch, who has refused since last year to grant land for the road. Acquisition of the property will permit Darrow & Barron, Waukegan contractors, to construct a half mile of paving in the link that runs from Route 59 at Antioch west for 10 miles into McHenry county.

Mrs. Smart was granted \$200 an acre for the land, or a total of \$778 for the 3.89 acres, according to Lobdel.

The only portion left in this long portion under construction is an eighth of a mile owned by Barney Nabor, of Antioch, a member of the county board of supervisors for a number of years. Nabor today was in conference with those in charge of obtaining right-of-ways.

At the time that the contract was let to Darrow & Barron it was stipulated that this work could proceed as fast as rights-of-way was acquired.

### Claims to Have Apple That Is 65 Years Old
