Howard Moran made a committee report of the happenings at the recent Mundelein meeting relative to the various relief and unemployment organizations. The report indicated all Lake county organizations intended to sponsor their drive for funds during a similar period and further indicated that Mayor Metzel had accepted the chairmanship of Finance committee in Highland Park.

Fred Gallagher, chairman of the Veteran's Hospital committee explained that his committee was planning to sponsor some entertainment for the inmates of the Great Lakes hospital. A complete report is to be made at the November meeting.

#### Urge Action on Road

After a great deal of discussion relative to the re-routing of N. Sheridan road and to the various entrances to Highland Park, motion was made by Hugo Schneider, seconded and carried, that a letter be written the City of Highland Park, recommending that proceedings be started against several property owners in that district to abandon the vacation of the now closed portion of that road. Those present felt that such vacation of the road was illegal and that the property should be returned to the City of Highland Park.

The complaints as outlined by General Bolles in so far as aerial target practise at Fort Sheridan is concerned during the months of June, July, August and September, were thoroughly discussed. The members realized the commercial value to Highland Park of the 1600 men connected with this unit of the War Department, and motion was made that the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce write General Bolles expressing its desire in the retention of this unit at Fort Sher-

The possibility of continuing N. Green Bay road direct from Ashland avenue, Highwood to Lake Forest on the west side of the railroads was thoroughly discussed. A committee, consisting of Herman Denzel, L. B. Sinclair and Joe Berube, was appointed to work with the officials of Highland Park, Highwood and Lake Forest in attempting to secure the right of way for this road so that the State Highway Department may start pavement of such road.

The matter of the N. C. Sorenson Express company in applying for a franchise to enter Highland Park on the south limits and leave on the north limits was discussed by the membership. Motion was made by Herman Denzel, seconded and carried, that we concur with the action of the City Council, who felt that the local expressing companies and railreads, due to their large investments, should merit our support at this time, and the Sorenson application be rejected.
