Make First Score

The Oak Park heavies made their first score when a Deerfield man fumbled a punt on his 20-yard line, and Ledyard, Oak Park's star full-back took the ball over on the next few plays. A pass was tried for the point but it failed.

No scoring was done in the second or third quarters, but Deerfield made lots of ground because of the heavy penalties imposed on Oak Park.

Both Score in Fourth

Oak Park opened the fourth quarter with an early score by Schwartz and got the extra point on a pretty kick by Nolan.

It looked as though Deerfield would go home scoreless, but during the last few minutes of play Deerfield punted off to Oak Park, the receiver fumbled, and Jones downed the ball behind the goal. The ball was put in play on the 2-yard line but went over on the next play. The gun sounded the end of the game after a few more plays and the final score was 13 to 6.

The Freshman-Sophs were not as strong as their mates and lost a hard game to the tune of 24 to 0.

Oak Park's frosh, having a team as heavy as our varsity, made it easy to hike through for touchdowns and kept the Blueclads from going places. Deerfield was not able to show its speed.
