## Highwood Woman Is Elected Oracle by Royal Neighbors

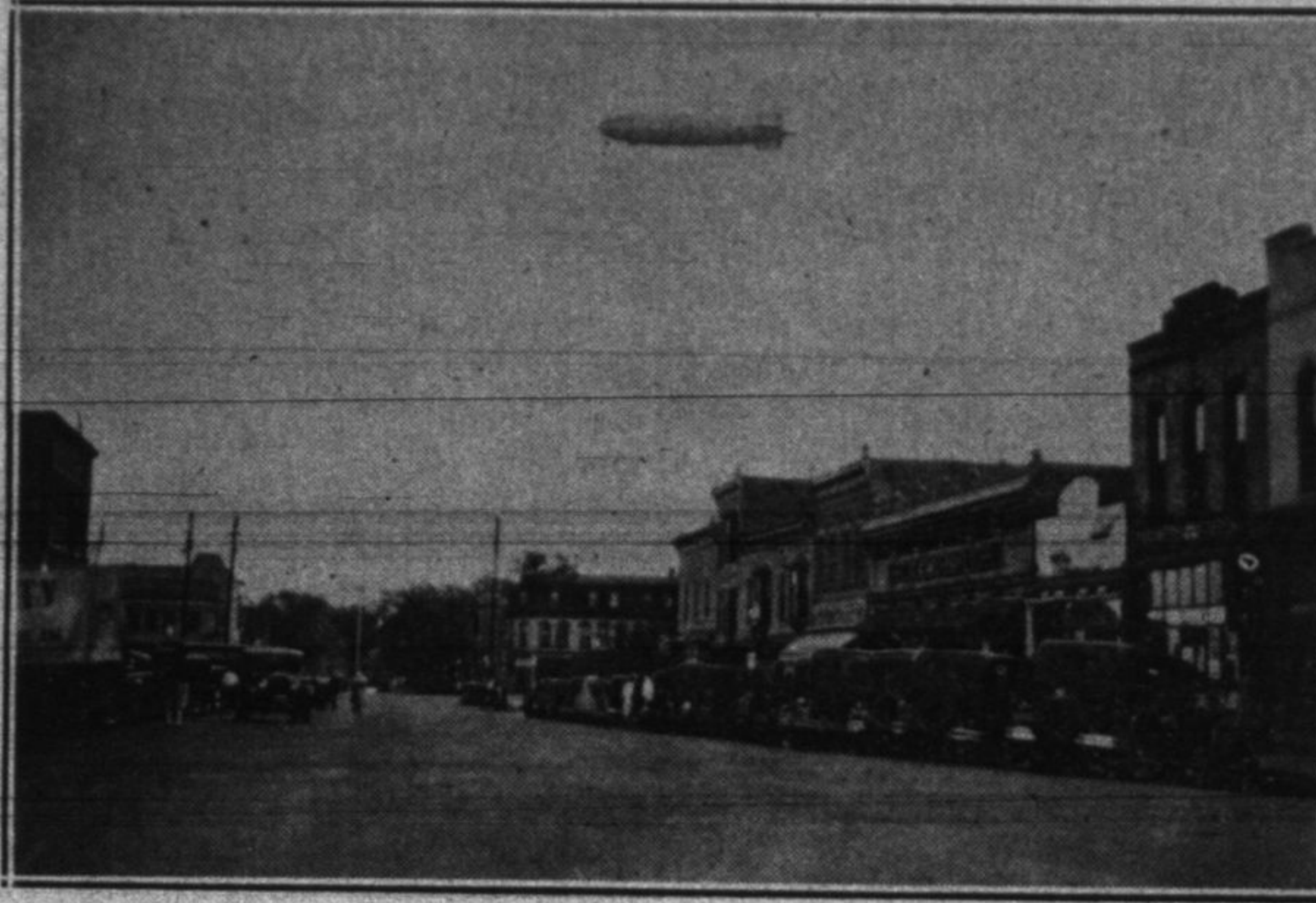

## Needlework Guild Is Providing Garments for Varied Charities

The Needlework Guild of America, an international organization having as its object the furnishing of new and suitable garments and household linen to hospitals and charities, today announced preparations for the collection of garments to be distributed this autumn.

"The guild has branches in 665 cities in the United States." The organization is non-sectarian, doing alike for every creed and color.

"The Needlework guild demands no dues nor meetings to attend, and only once a year, in the fall, the members are asked to give two or more articles of clothing for men, woman or children. The garments must be two of a kind, meaning two of the same quality and size. Thus each person who receives has a change and does not have to go to bed while one garment is being washed.

"The demand made upon the hospitals and charitable institutions are tremendous, and no institution has money enough to meet all of the calls. Gifts of the Needlework guild, of clothing the institutions otherwise would have to buy, releases money toward food and the general comfort of the inmates."

The Highland Park branch distributes garments to the Dorcas Home, Ridge Farm Preventorium for Girls, Lake Bluff Orphanage, Highland Park hospital and the H. P. Social Service.

## U. S. AKRON FLIES OVER NORTH SHORE

**Big Navy Dirigible on Test Trip Sails to Milwaukee and Return; Features**

The big dirigible, Akron, largest of its type, on Saturday morning flew leisurely over the north shore to Milwaukee and returned to Chicago by practically the same route, giving residents of Highland Park, Lake Forest and other north shore communities splendid views of this latest "queen of the air," and thousands of people all along the route watched the flight with interest.

Coming into view from the south at about 10:15 o'clock the ship moved slowly northward over Highland Park, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, the Great Lakes Naval training station, North Chicago and Waukegan and then into the north. After circling the city of Milwaukee the giant dirigible again passed over these cities on the return trip southward.

A list of the officials of these groups is given and the book concludes with a brief history of the Ravinia Civic association, its interests and achievements, together with lists of its officers and boards of directors since it was originally organized as the Ravinia Commission.
