**Includes Birthday of Founder;  
Day by Day Program for  
Week Is Given**

Girl Scout Week comes in the fall of the year, and includes the birthday of our founder, Juliette Low, which is Hallowe'en. The week is set aside so that the public may become familiar with the activities in which Girl Scouts habitually engage. It opens on Sunday, when the girls attend service in the churches to which they belong, in uniform and sitting together as far as is possible. Each girl who has a uniform is asked to wear it throughout this week.

To make each day a demonstration day of a different service is the suggestion of the national office this year.

Each girl during this week renews her Girl Scout promise, motto, slogan and laws and makes a point to live them each and every day.

### Day By Day

October 26 — Homemaking Monday. Mother's day off—at least after 4:00 p.m. Let the girls plan to prepare the evening meal (all second class scouts can do this). Those who are not able to cook dinner can prepare vegetables, set the table, etc. Leaders might help girls plan a simple menu.

October 27—Cooking class Tuesday. Beginning a six weeks cooking demonstration given us through the Public Service Co. Any Girl Scout may attend. Bring note book and pencil. 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## Local People in Cast Memorial Performance at Art Theatre, Oct. 26

At a memorial performance to be given in honor of Ivan Lazareff, founder of the Chicago Art theatre, on Monday evening, Oct. 26, at the Art theatre, 410 S. Michigan avenue, Peggy Glidden of Highland Park, and Mary Gehr of Ravinia, will take part in "Will O' the Wisp," one of the two sketches to be presented.

Chicago audiences saw Ivan Lazareff in 1923 when he played in "The Lower Depths," presented by the Moscow Art Theatre company of which he was a member. They saw him again as the Mad Emperor in Morris Gest's "Miracle." After the season in which the "Miracle" was played, Mr. Lazareff and Maria Astrova Lazareff, his wife, remained in Chicago where they founded the Chicago Art theatre.

This consists of a repertory company which goes on tour several times during the year in cities and universities throughout the middle west, in plays produced according to the Moscow Art theatre methods of acting. In connection with the company is a school where young people are trained to take part in the company. Madame Lazareff is carrying on the work of director and producer since her husband's death.

Miss Glidden, daughter of the Henry L. Gliddens, who is making her social debut this season, has appeared in several student performances at the Chicago Art theatre, where she has been receiving dramatic training.

Miss Gehr enacts the role of Will O' the Wisp. She is now a member of the company, and will tour in the part of Hester in "The Silver Cord," during November and December. Her work for the past years has evoked much praise from Highland Park and Chicago audiences.
